Brief Summary:

The City of Harlingen selected Freese and Nichols, Inc to develop the city's new comprehensive plan on June 19, 2024 (RFQ No. 2024-09). At the request of the City Commission, Freese and Nichols, Inc. was asked to also develop the parks and downtown master plans. In early September 2024, the city kicked off this project, and it has been underway for over 12 months.

Freese and Nichols has now completed these three core planning documents designed to guide growth and development over the next 25 years: the *Harlingen Horizon – A City on the Rise* Comprehensive Plan, the Parks, Recreation, Open Space & Trails (PROST) Plan, and the Downtown Plan. Together, these plans provide a coordinated framework for land use, infrastructure, housing, transportation, parks and recreation, and downtown revitalization, aligning city investments, policies, and private development with community priorities.

A Steering Committee of city staff, elected officials, and community representatives worked closely with the consultant team to ensure alignment and accountability throughout the planning process. Public engagement was central to this effort, utilizing online mapping tools, surveys, workshops, and open houses. This engagement allowed residents to provide input that directly shaped priorities across all three plans.

Key themes emerging from public input highlighted Harlingen's strengths, including a strong sense of community, family-friendly character, and quality of life. Opportunities identified by the community include expanding retail and business development, improving connectivity and infrastructure, and enhancing parks and trail systems. For downtown, residents emphasized revitalized public spaces, improved building facades, shaded walkways, and stronger pedestrian and bicycle connectivity.

These plans provide the City Commission with a long-term roadmap to guide decisions, investments, and policies. They support proactive planning, ensure alignment across departments, and provide mechanisms to track progress and update priorities over time. Adoption of the plans will formalize guidance for development and investment decisions, enabling the city to achieve the community's vision for growth, quality of life, and downtown vitality.

ORDINANCE NO. 2025 - _____

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HARLINGEN, TEXAS, CALLING A PUBLIC HEARING TO BE HELD JOINTLY BY THE CITY COMMISSION AND THE PLANNING AND ZONING COMMISSION REGARDING THE ADOPTION OF THE COMPREHENSIVE, DOWNTOWN, AND PARKS PLANS TO BECOME EFFECTIVE UPON THEIR PASSAGE AND APPROVAL.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Harlingen retained a professional planning consultant to assist in the preparation of a new Comprehensive Plan, Downtown Plan and Parks Plan for the City; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission appointed a Plans Steering Committee (PSC) to guide the recommendations made by the planning consultant for the Comprehensive Plan, Downtown Plan, and Parks Plan; and

WHEREAS, community meetings and online tools were held throughout the planning process to allow for public engagement and feedback on the Plan content; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Zoning Commission and the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board received briefings on the draft Plans in September 2025; and

WHEREAS, the drafts of the Plans were made public on October 10, 2025, in which the community was provided the opportunity to review and provide comments on the draft plan, and those comments were provided as part of the backup for this meeting; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HARLINGEN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That the Comprehensive Plan, the Downtown Plan, and the Parks and Recreation Plan, including all chapters and maps, which are attached hereto and incorporated herein for all purposes, is hereby adopted by the City Commission as a guide and public policy.

SECTION 2: That these Plans are intended to constitute the Comprehensive Plan or Master Plan of the City of Harlingen, Texas, for all matters relating to long-range guidance relative to zoning and land use decisions, land subdivision, thoroughfare construction, park and recreation planning, and growth management as authorized by Chapter 213 of the Texas Local Government Code.

SECTION 3: That it is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance is passed was properly noticed and open to the public as required by law.

SECTION 4: That this Ordinance shall become effective on and after its passage and approval.

Comprehensive Plan Engagement Summary

Steering Committee Meetings

The Plans Steering Committee (PSC) plays a pivotal role in the development of the Comprehensive Plan, as well as the Parks, Recreation, Open Space and Trails (PROST) and Downtown Plans. The PSC works to ensure City staff and consultants are in close alignment with the community's needs and vision, as gathered during various opportunities for public input and feedback. The PSC not only provides guidance but also shapes the general vision for the plan, offering insights into effective community engagement strategies. By leveraging their expertise and taking into account public input, the PSC is integral to both the process and development of plan recommendations. Apart from the consultants and City staff who form the "primary" project team, the PSC members are the individuals most closely involved in the process.

The following members were appointed to the Plans Steering Committee (PSC):

- City of Harlingen Mayor Norma Sepulveda
- City Commission: Ford Kinsley (District 1) and Daniel Lopez (District 2)
- Planning and Zoning Commission: Luis Villarreal and Sergio Perez
- Parks and Recreation Board: Adele Clinton-Solis and Diana Esparza
- Downtown Advisory Board: Lars Keim and John Percy

The Steering Committee conducted three meetings at Harlingen City Hall during the process, which were open for public observation. Each session reviewed the progress of each plan, public input received and requested feedback on draft deliverables to lay the groundwork for future recommendations. The meetings centered on the following topics:

- Kickoff and Data Analysis
- Public Engagement Plan
- Community Feedback
- Vision and Goals
- Draft Deliverables
- Plan Implementation



PSC Meeting (November 19, 2024)

Stakeholder Meetings

Stakeholder discussions help the consultant team and City staff gain a deeper understanding of various topics and contexts within Harlingen. These conversations can provide expert insights on specific subjects or address the needs of particular resident groups. Through initial discussions and analysis, the project team identified key topics and recurring themes of importance. Stakeholder conversations were conducted as group meetings either online or in person at Harlingen City Hall.

There were 10 stakeholder conversations during the plan’s development. These conversations occurred concurrently while developing the Parks, Recreation, Open Space and Trails (PROST) Plan and the Downtown Plan. The stakeholder groups engaged during the process provided general guidance and a deeper understanding of community needs while also providing technical feedback for specific recommendations. These stakeholder groups included:

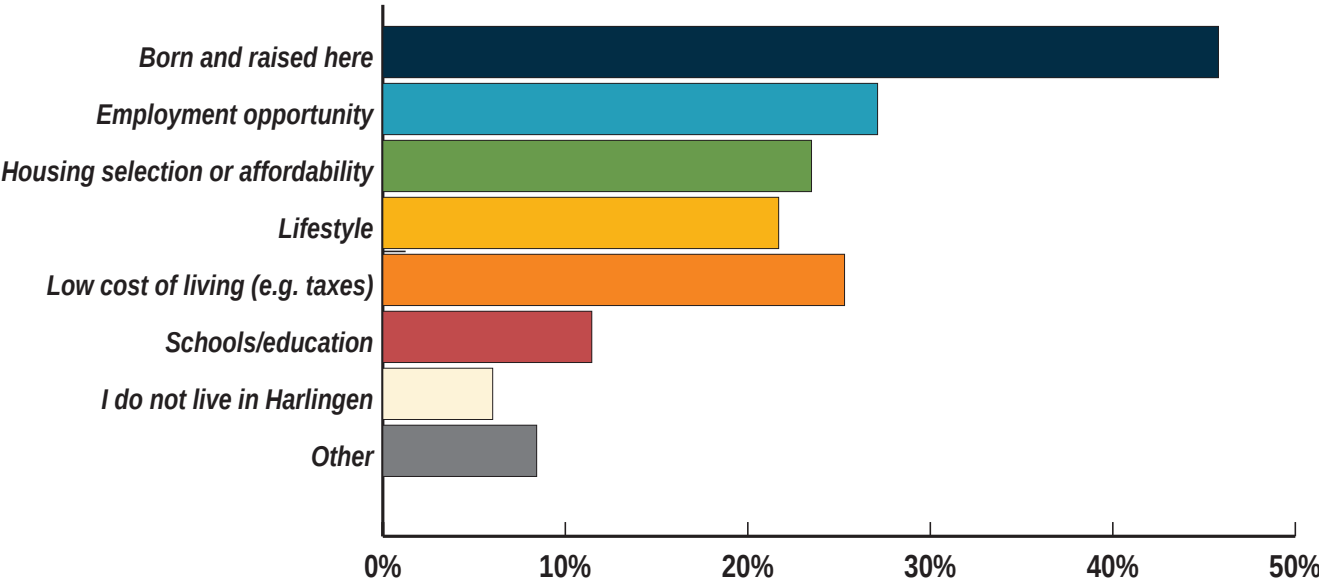

Comprehensive Plan Community Survey Responses

From October 30, 2024, to February 8, 2025, an online community survey was hosted on the Harlingen project website. Open to all, the survey featured translation tools to accommodate multiple languages and was accessible on both desktop and mobile devices. Outreach efforts to promote participation in the online survey included distributing flyers, promoting the survey on the local news and sharing information through the City’s social media platforms. The survey received 166 responses while it was available to the public, and below is a summary of the public feedback received. This survey, as well as insights from public engagement events and stakeholder groups, provided the project team with essential baseline data and community priorities to guide the project’s development.

Question 1. What is your primary reason for choosing to live in Harlingen?



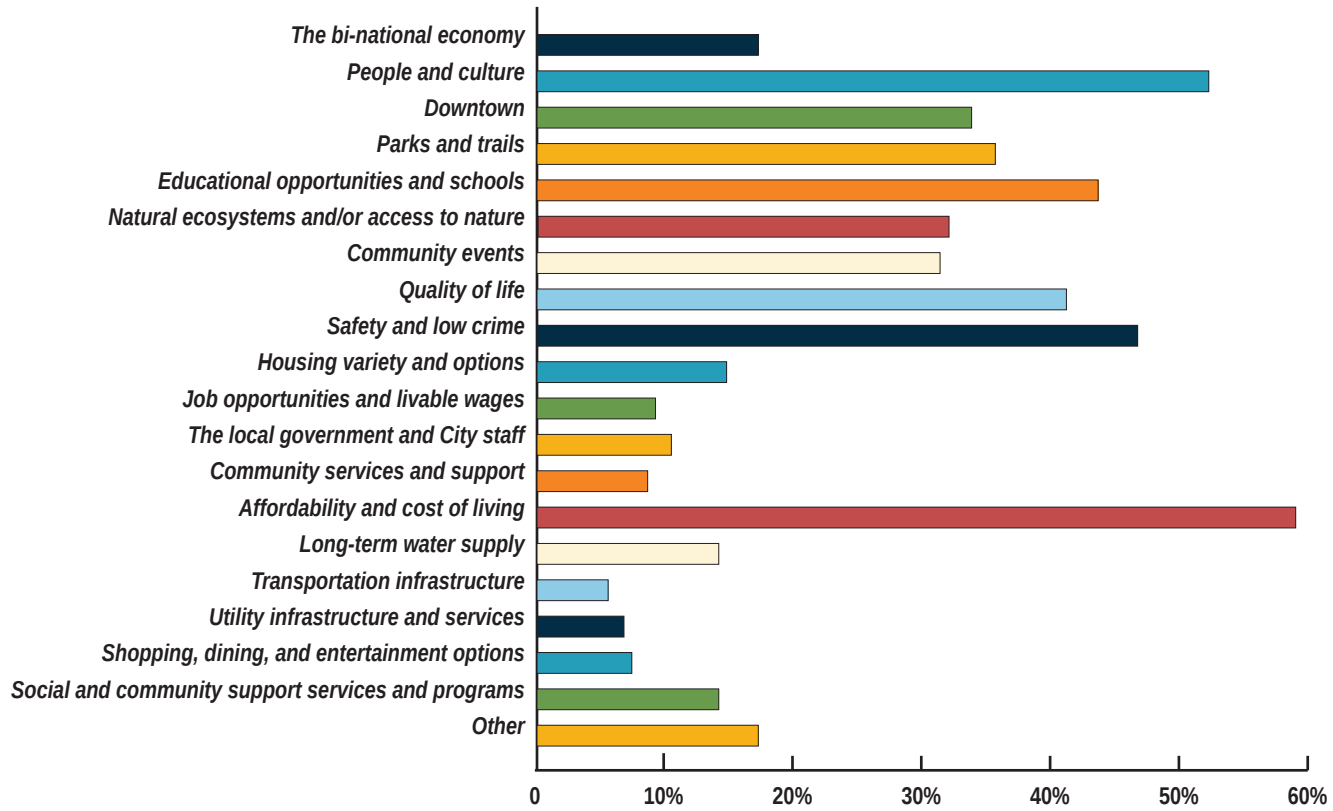
The main reason respondents gave for living in Harlingen is that they were born and raised here (45.78%); however, many were drawn to the City for economic reasons such as employment opportunities (27.11%), the low cost of living (25.3%), and affordable housing selection (23.49%).

Question 2. In the future, I want Harlingen to:



When asked what they want to see from Harlingen in the future, most responses related to the local economy. The primary response was that the City should be known for its great shopping, dining, and entertainment (16.27%). Respondents also want Harlingen to be a community with high-paying jobs (13.86%) and a place of economic activity (10.24%).

Question 3. In your opinion, what are Harlingen’s greatest strengths? What differentiates it from any other city?

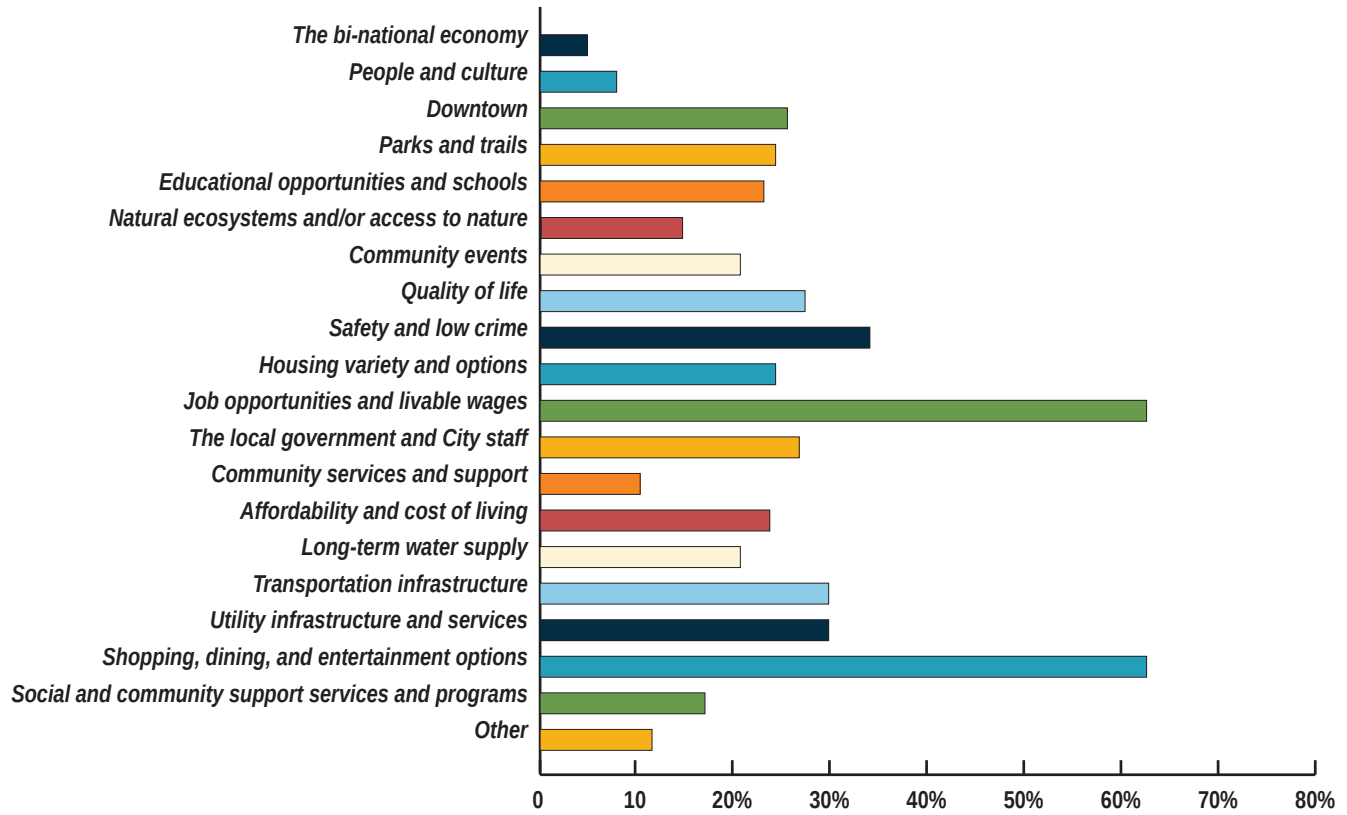


For most respondents, Harlingen’s greatest strength is its affordability and low cost of living (58.9%). Harlingen’s people and culture distinguish it from other cities (52.15%). Other strengths that set Harlingen apart include the City’s educational opportunities (43.56%), public safety (46.63%), and quality of life (41.1%)

Question 5. In your opinion, what are Harlingen’s most critical issues?

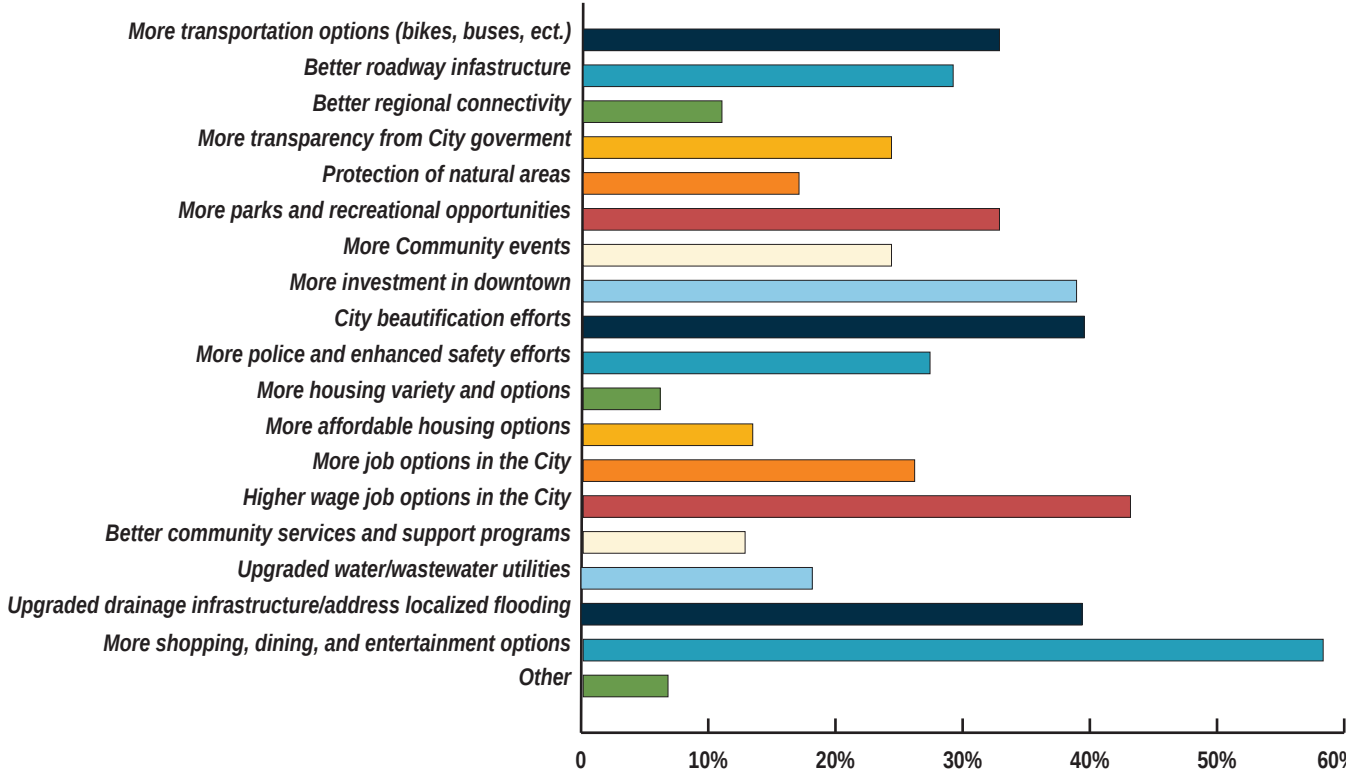


According to respondents, the most critical issues facing the City of Harlingen are job opportunities and livable wages and shopping, dining, and entertainment options; 62.42% of respondents chose both options. In comparison, things like the binational economy, people and culture, community services, and social support programs are among the least pressing issues.

Question 6. If you would like to provide additional thoughts or clarifications on Harlingen’s critical issues, please provide those here.

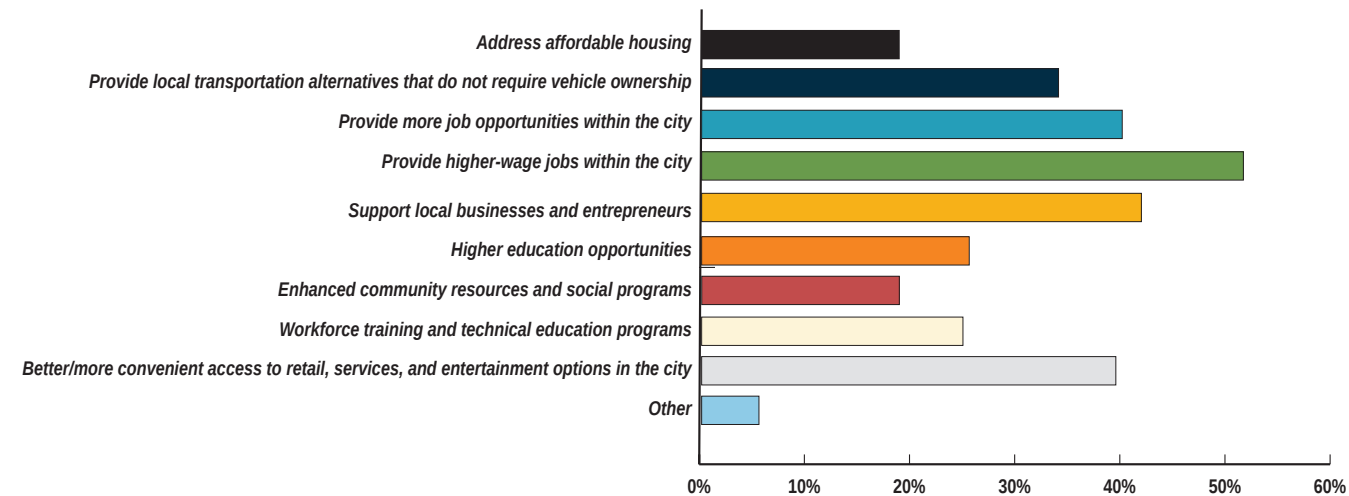


Question 7. What about Harlingen would you like to see change or improve?



More than half of respondents (58.18%) want to see more shopping, dining, and entertainment options in Harlingen. The second most significant change identified by respondents is higher-wage job options in the City (43.03%). Other improvements identified by respondents include City beautification efforts (39.39%), upgraded drainage infrastructure to address local flooding (39.39%), and more investment in downtown (38.79%).

Question 8. In your opinion, what strategies would be most helpful in supporting all Harlingen residents to thrive and prosper in our community?

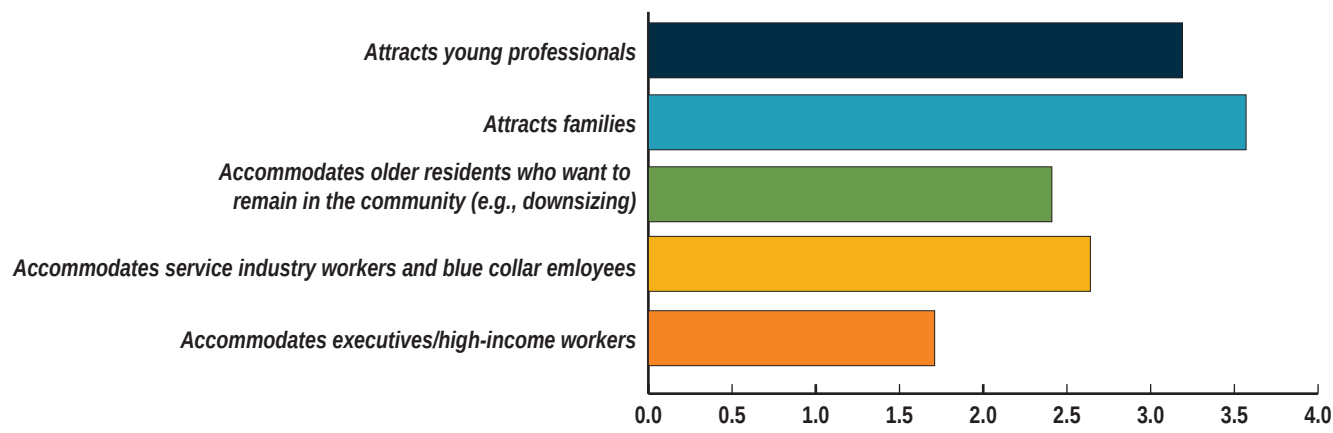


For over half of respondents, the best strategy to support Harlingen residents is to provide higher-paying jobs (51.52%). This is followed by supporting local businesses and entrepreneurs (41.82%), providing more job opportunities (40%), and providing more convenient access to retail, services, and entertainment options in the City (39.39%). Initiatives to boost the local economy will help the whole community prosper.

Question 9. If you could do one big thing to make Harlingen the best place it could be, what would that be?

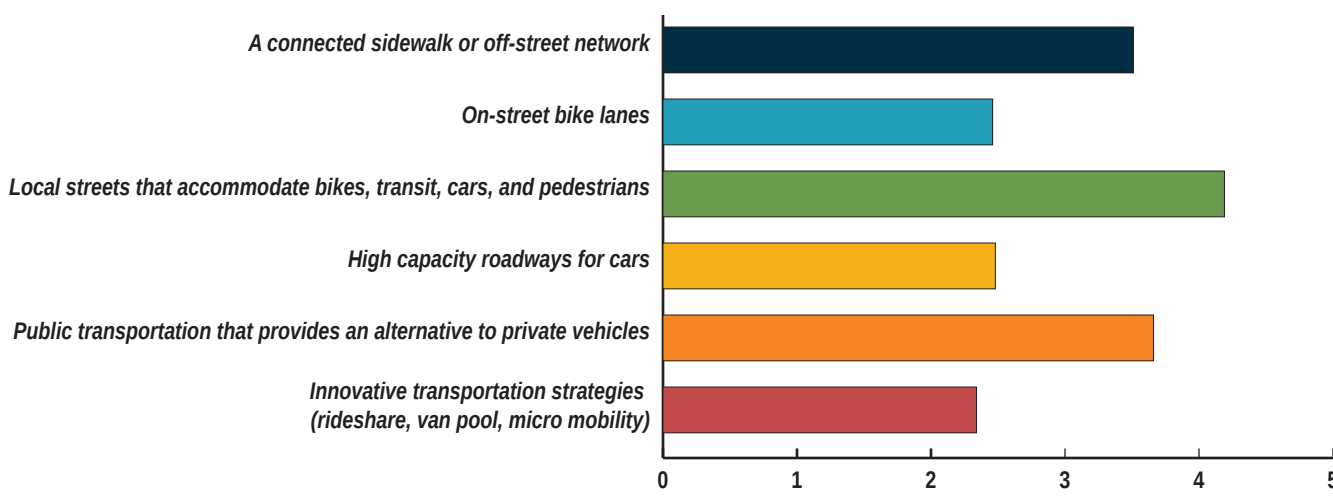


Question 10. In the future, Harlingen should focus on housing that:



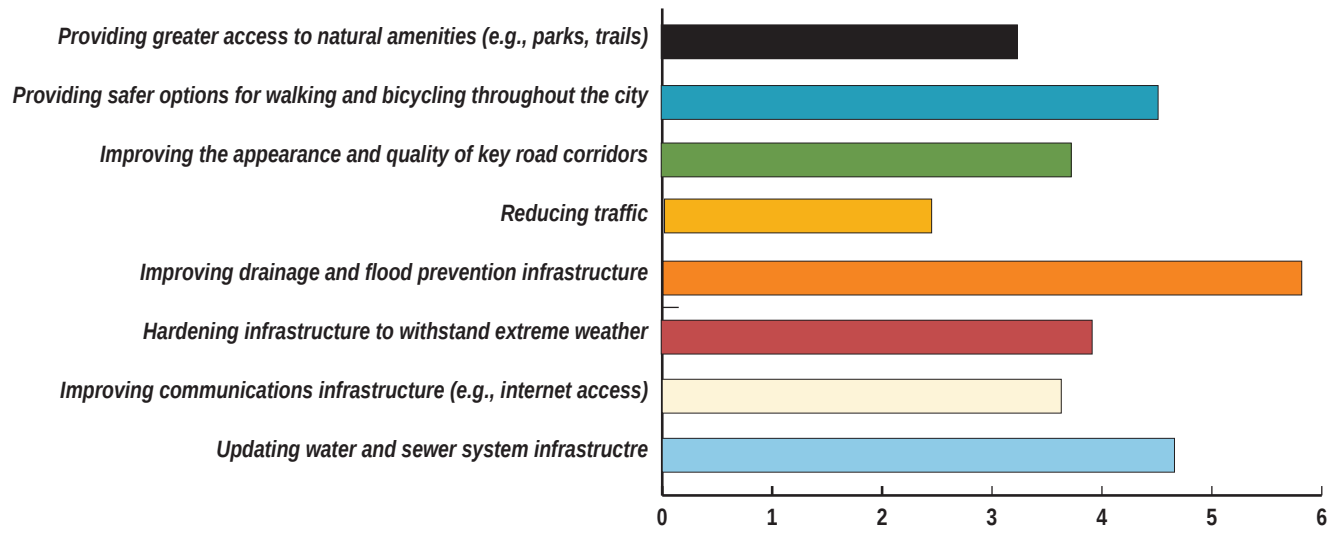
Respondents want Harlingen to focus on housing that attracts families and young professionals. At the same time, the City should ensure that affordable housing is available to accommodate older residents looking to downsize and residents working in the service industry or blue-collar jobs.

Question 11. In the future, residents should be connected to destinations within the City through:



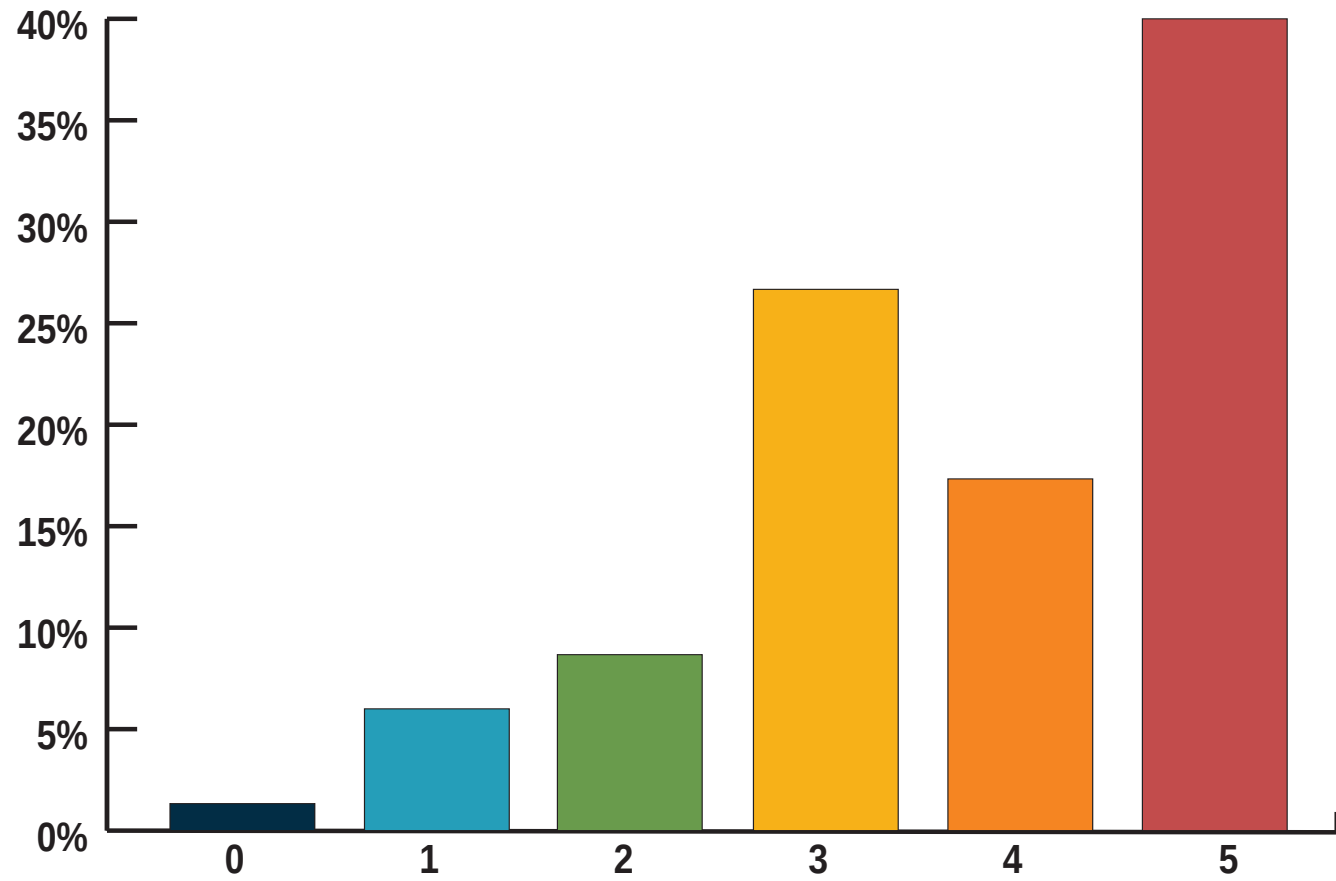
The primary way respondents wish to be connected to destinations in Harlingen is through local streets that accommodate bikes, transit, cars, and pedestrians, followed closely by public transportation that provides an alternative to private vehicles. These responses indicate a desire for improved multi-modal transportation within the City of Harlingen.

Question 12. Infrastructure investments the City should focus on:



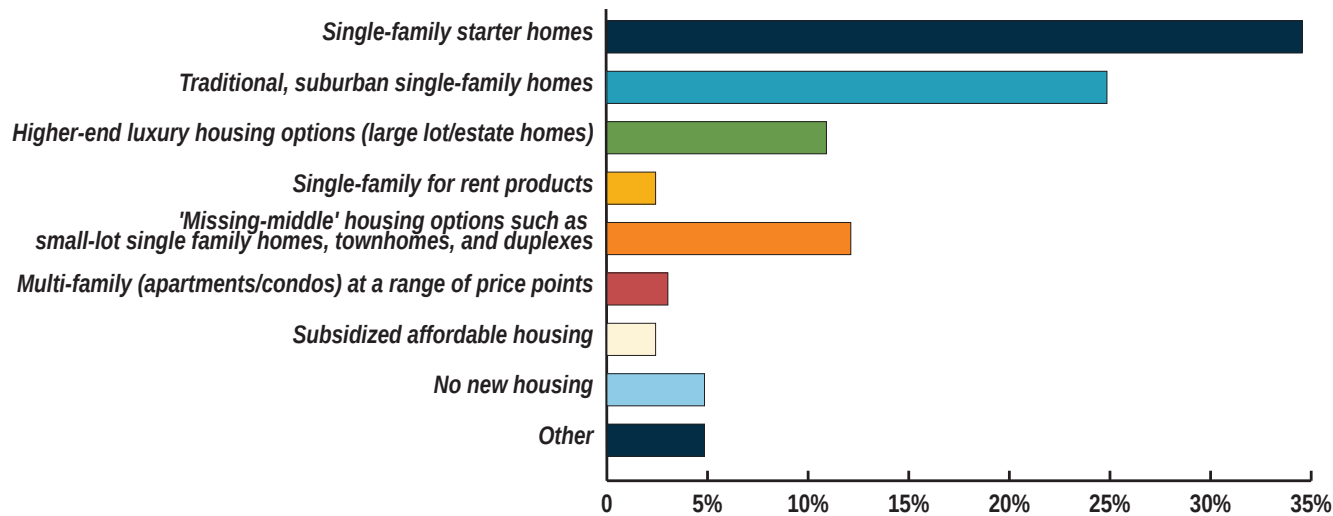
Most of the infrastructure investments identified by respondents are related to the City’s water and wastewater management or transportation system. The top priorities are improving drainage and flood prevention infrastructure and updating water and sewer system infrastructure. Additionally, the City should focus on providing safer options for walking and bicycling throughout the City.

Question 13. How supportive are you of bringing more residential land-uses (e.g., housing, apartments) to Harlingen?



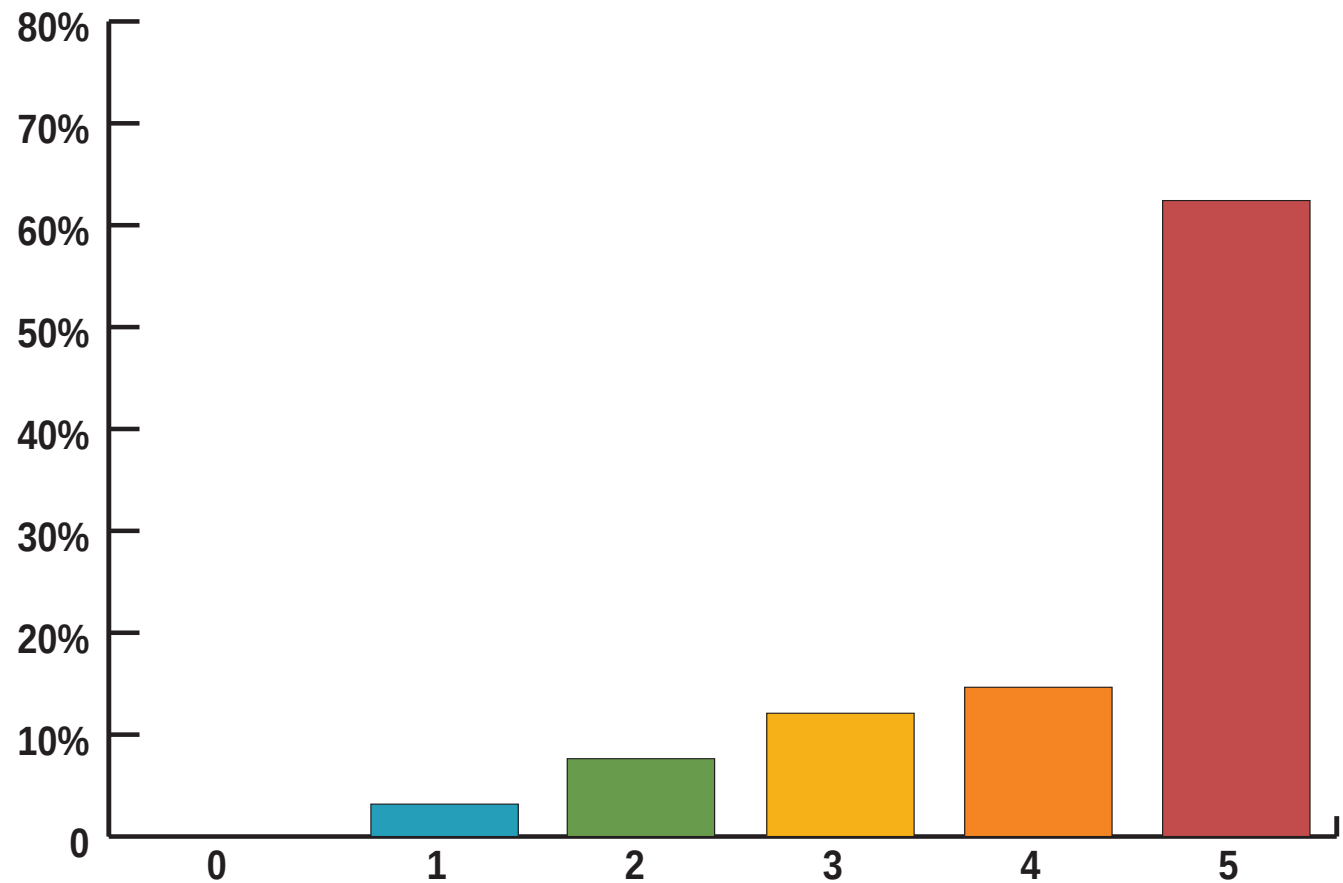
Respondents generally support bringing more residential land use to Harlingen. On a scale of 0-5, the average level of support among respondents is 3.73, with the largest percentage offering 5/5 or 100% approval.

Question 14. I would support more of the following housing options in Harlingen:



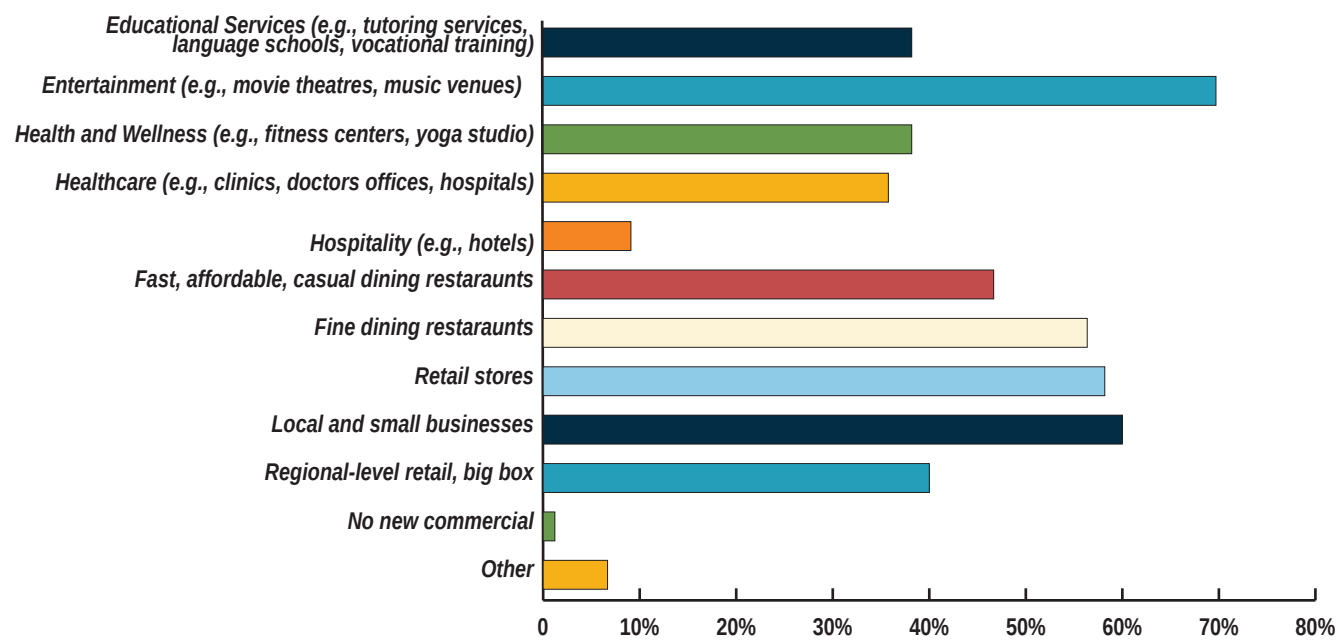
The primary forms of housing respondents want to see in Harlingen are affordable single-family starter homes (34.55%) and suburban single-family houses (24.85%). There is some support for “missing middle” housing types. However, traditional homeownership appears to be a big priority in the community. This is reflected in the lack of support for single-family rentals, multi-family apartments, and subsidized housing.

Question 15. How supportive are you of bringing more commercial land-uses (e.g., shops, restaurants, offices) in Harlingen?



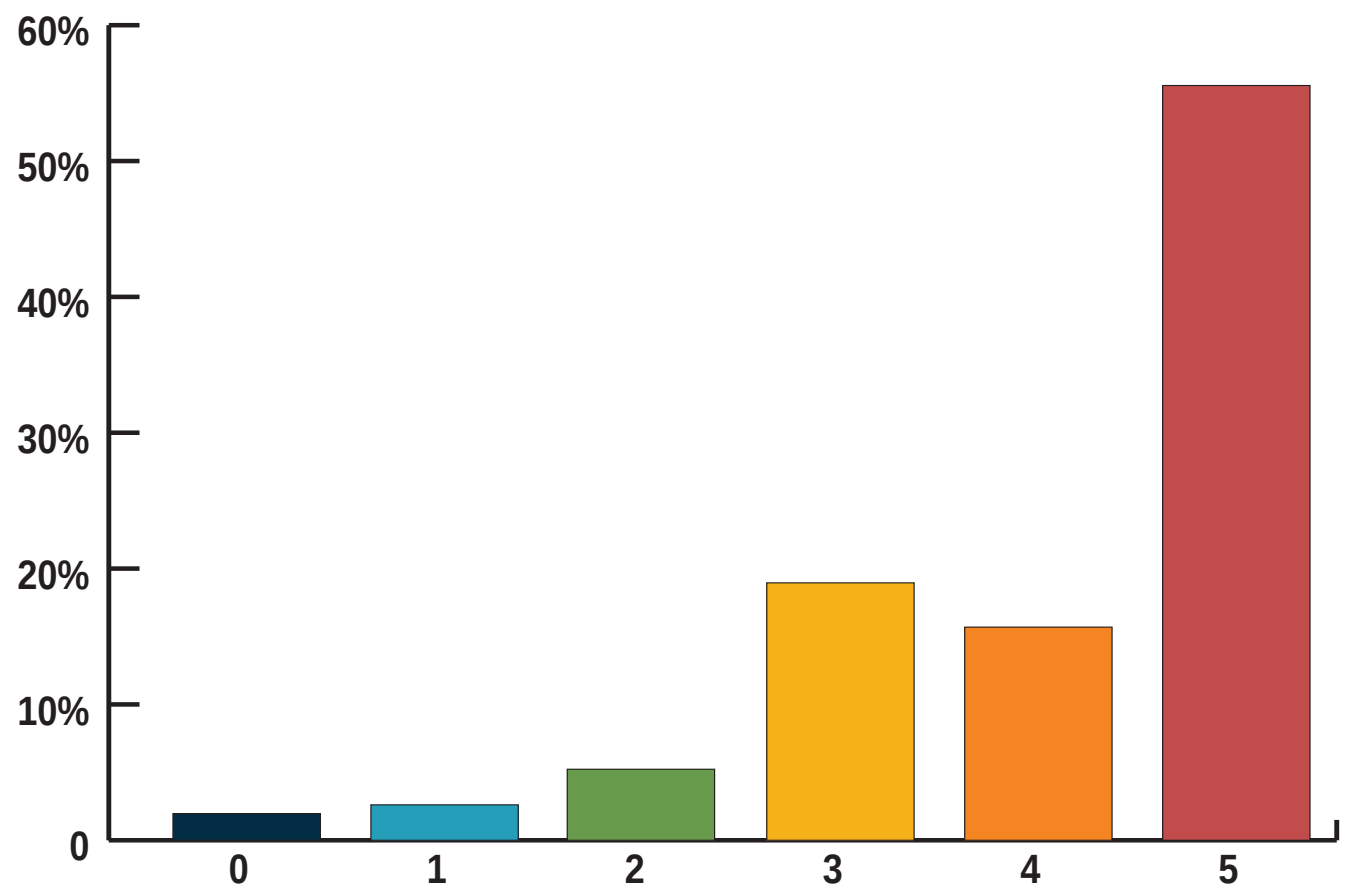
The overwhelming majority of respondents support more commercial land uses in Harlingen. On a scale of 0-5, the average level of support is 4.25, with more than half of the respondents giving their full support.

Question 16. What commercial businesses would you like to see more of in Harlingen?



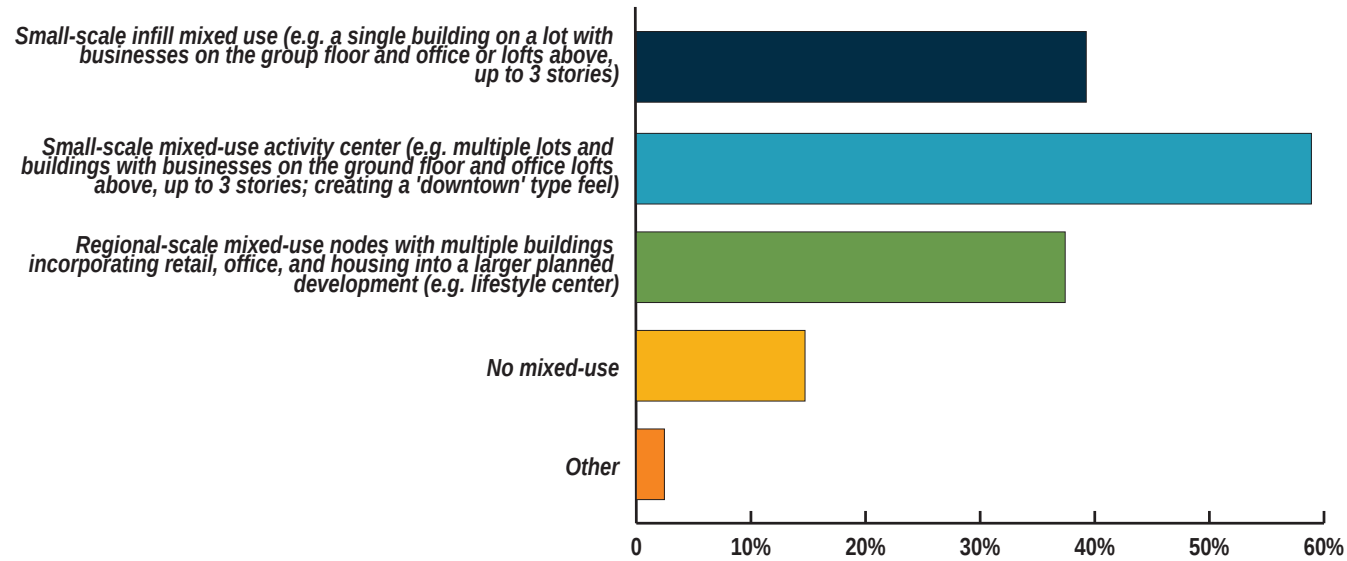
When asked what kind of businesses Harlingen needs more of, most respondents answered entertainment (69.7%). More than half of respondents also chose local and small businesses (60%), retail stores (58.18%), and fine dining restaurants (56.36%). Only two respondents said they do not want to see any new commercial businesses in Harlingen.

Question 17. How supportive are you of bringing more mixed-use developments (e.g., areas where residential, commercial and recreational uses are combined) to Harlingen?



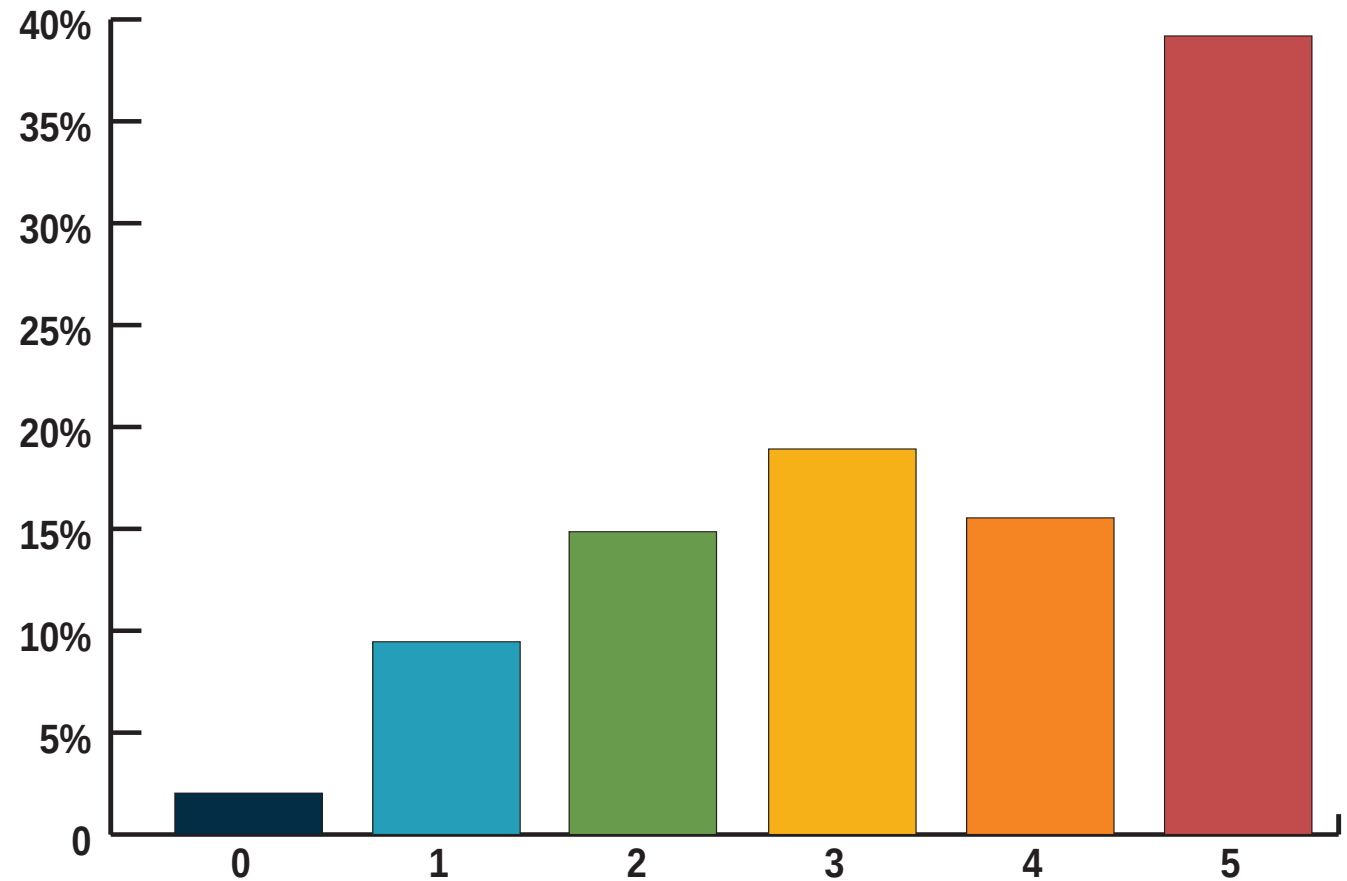
Respondents are generally supportive of bringing more mixed-use developments to Harlingen. On a scale of 0-5, the average level of support is 4.10, with a little more than half of respondents giving their full support.

Question 18. What types of mixed-use development would you like to see in Harlingen?



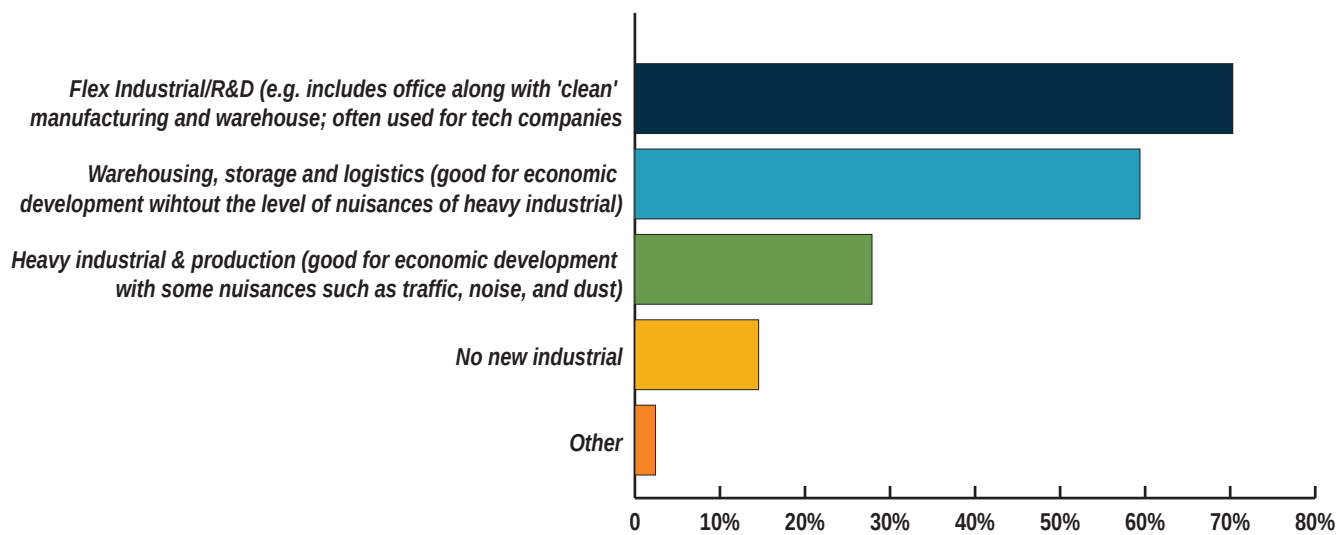
Small-scale mixed-use developments received the most support among respondents, primarily in the form of mixed-use activity centers (58.9%) or infill projects (39.26%). There was also some support for regional-scale mixed-use nodes, while almost 15% of respondents opposed mixed-use altogether.

Question 19. How supportive are you of bringing more industrial land-uses (e.g., factories, warehousing) to Harlingen?



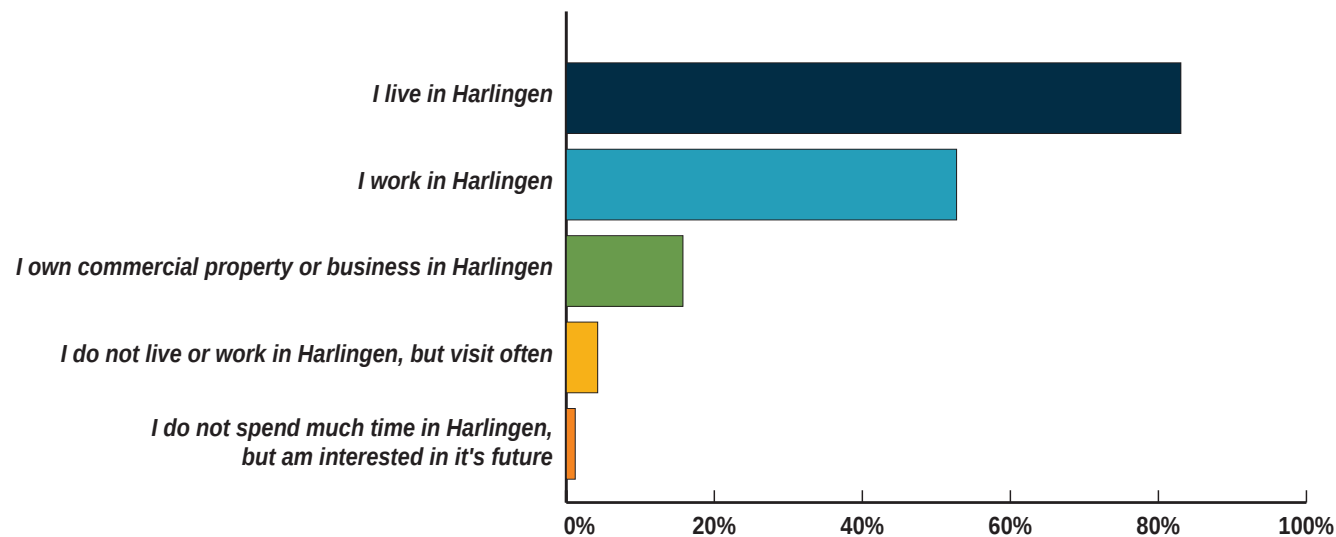
Support for industrial land-uses in Harlingen was mixed but leaned more in favor of it. On a scale of 0-5, the average level of support is 3.54; however, 5/5 or 100% support still received the largest percentage of responses.

Question 20. What types of industrial development would you like to see more of in Harlingen?



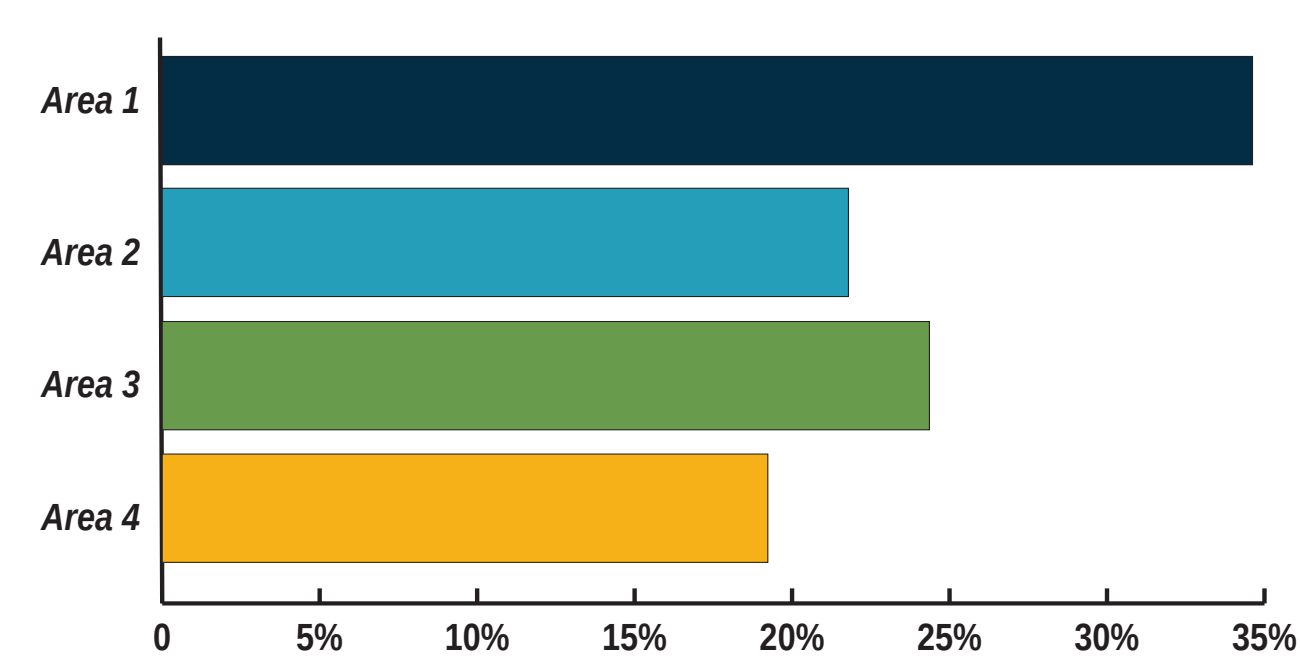
Respondents showed a preference for light industrial uses like flex industrial and R&D (70.3%) and warehousing, storage, and logistics (59.39%). Over a quarter of respondents support some heavy industrial uses despite the associated nuisances, while nearly 15% do not support any new industrial.

Question 21. Which of the below describes you?



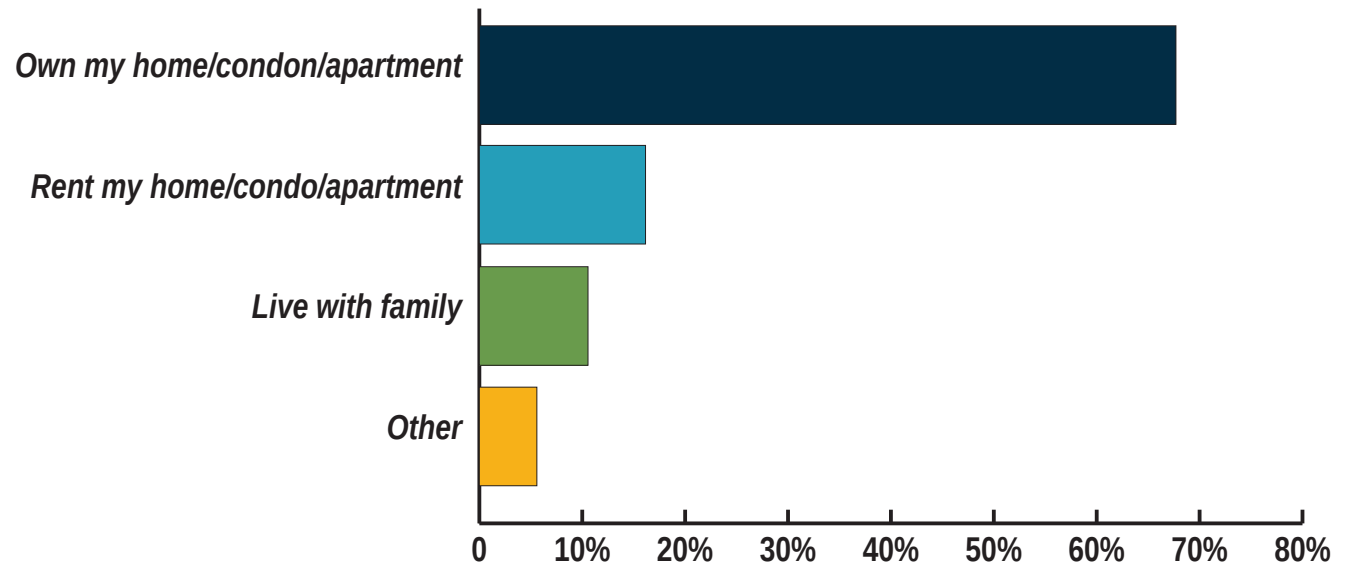
Most respondents live in Harlingen (83.03%), followed closely by those who work in the City (52.73%). More than 15% of respondents own a commercial property or business in the City.

Question 22. Which area of Harlingen do you live?



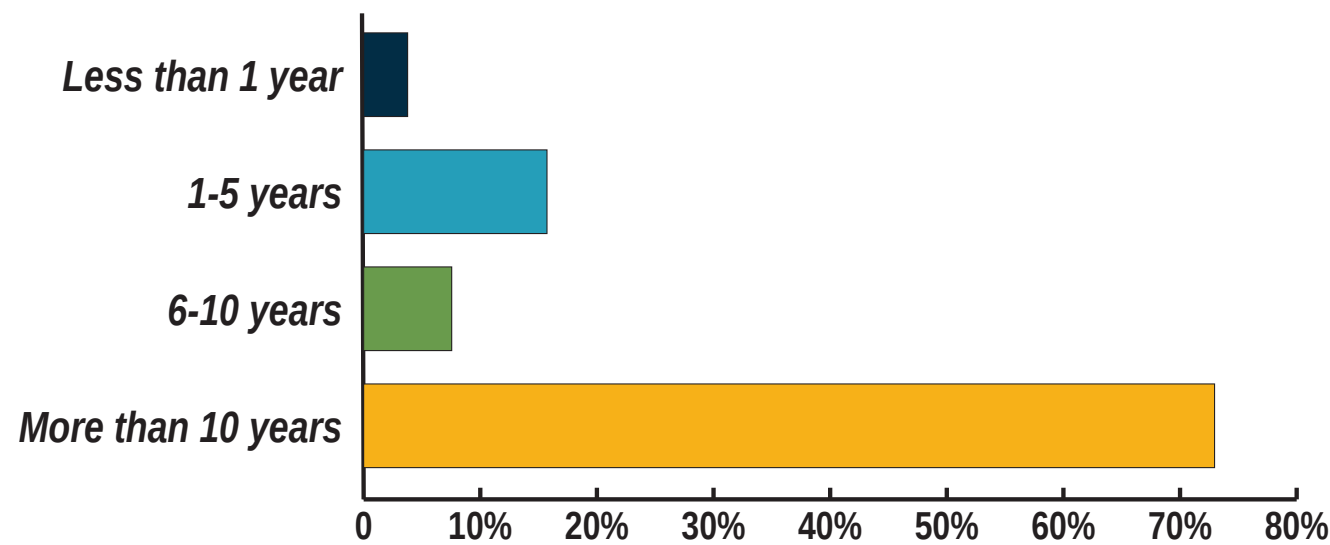
Respondents were provided with a map of Harlingen divided into four areas and then asked which area they lived in. Most respondents live in Area 1 (34.62%), which includes downtown and the surrounding areas. It is followed by Area 3 to the south (24.36%), Area 2 to the northeast (21.79%), and Area 4 to the west (19.23%).

Question 23. If you live in Harlingen, what best describes your living situation?



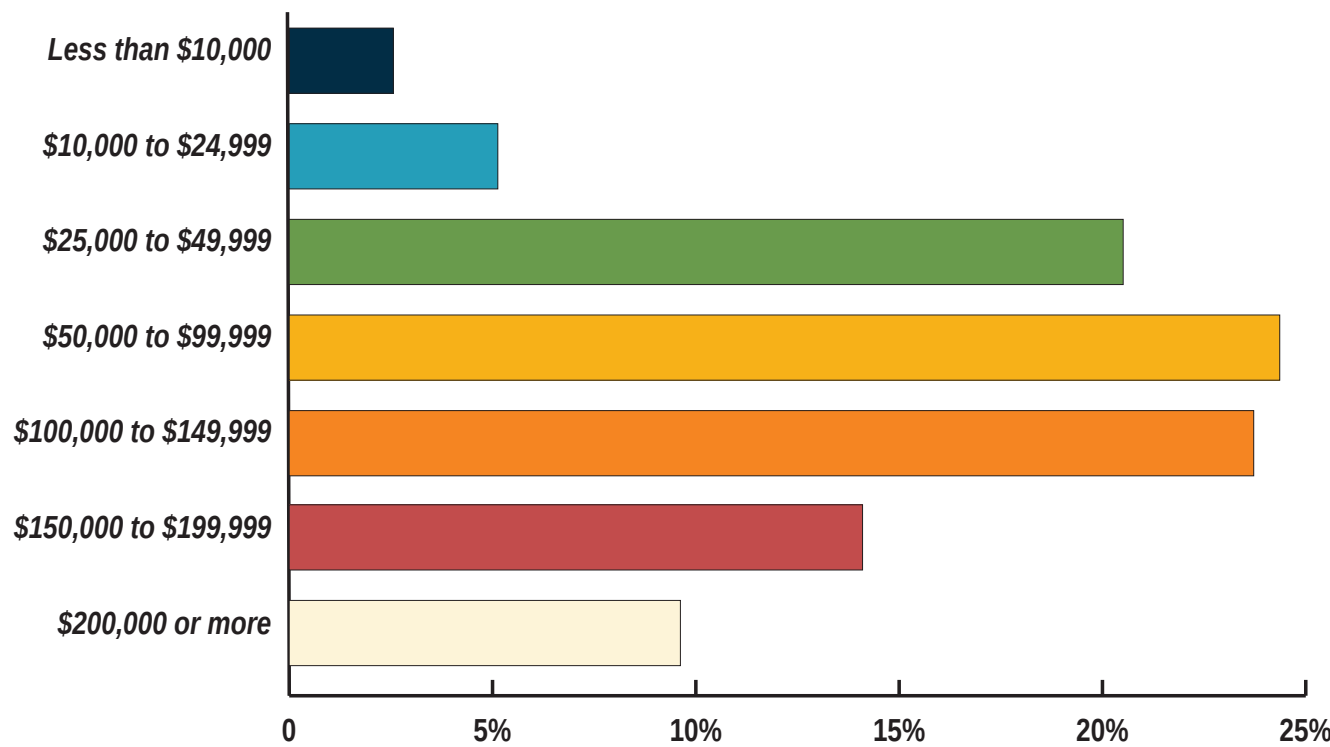
Most respondents living in Harlingen own their own home, with nearly 70% indicating such. This is followed by respondents who rent (16.15%) and those who live with family (10.56%).

Question 24. If you live in Harlingen, how many years have you lived here?



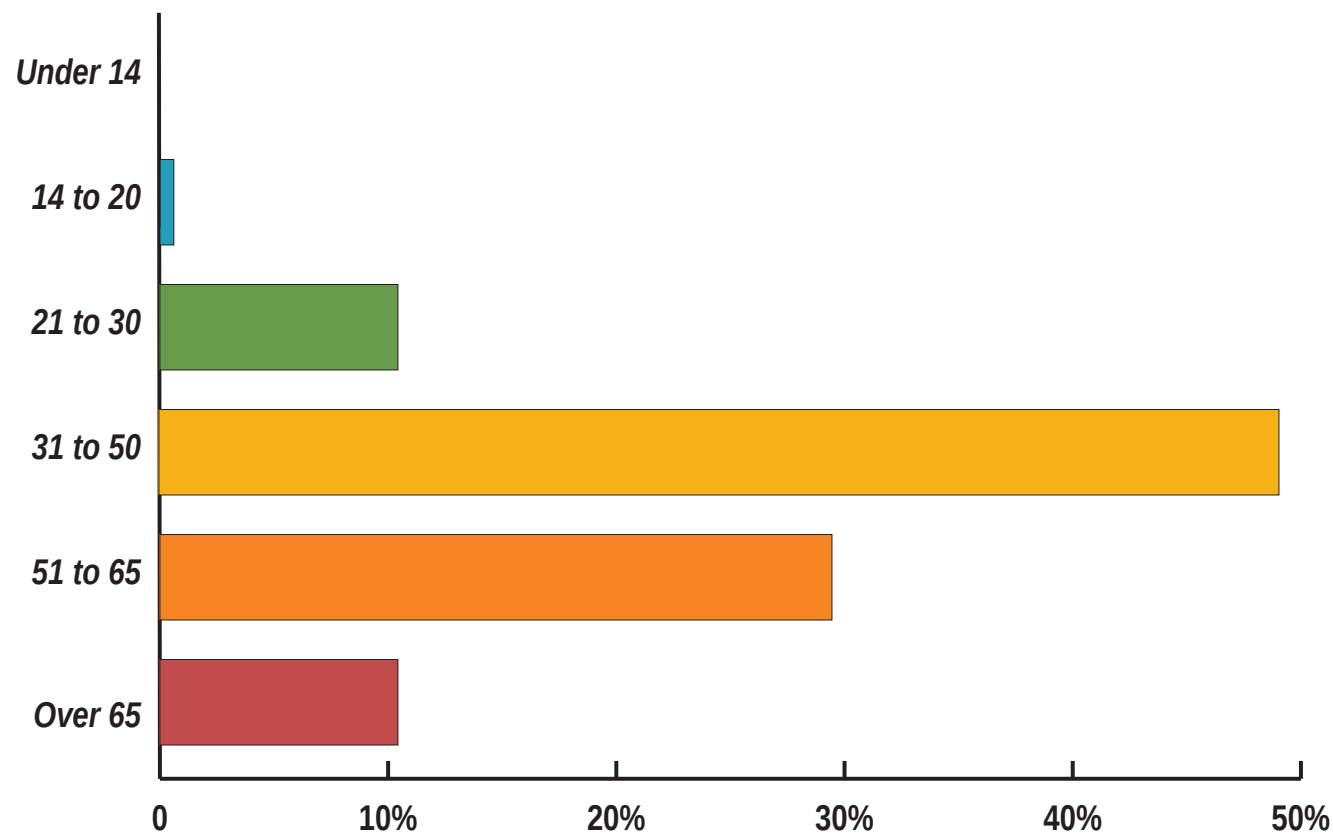
More than 70% of respondents have lived in Harlingen for over 10 years. Far behind at nearly 16%, the second largest group consists of those who have lived in Harlingen between 1 to 5 years, followed by those who’ve lived in the City for 6 to 10 years at approximately 8%. Less than 4% of respondents have lived in Harlingen for under a year.

Question 25. What is your household income in the last 12 months?



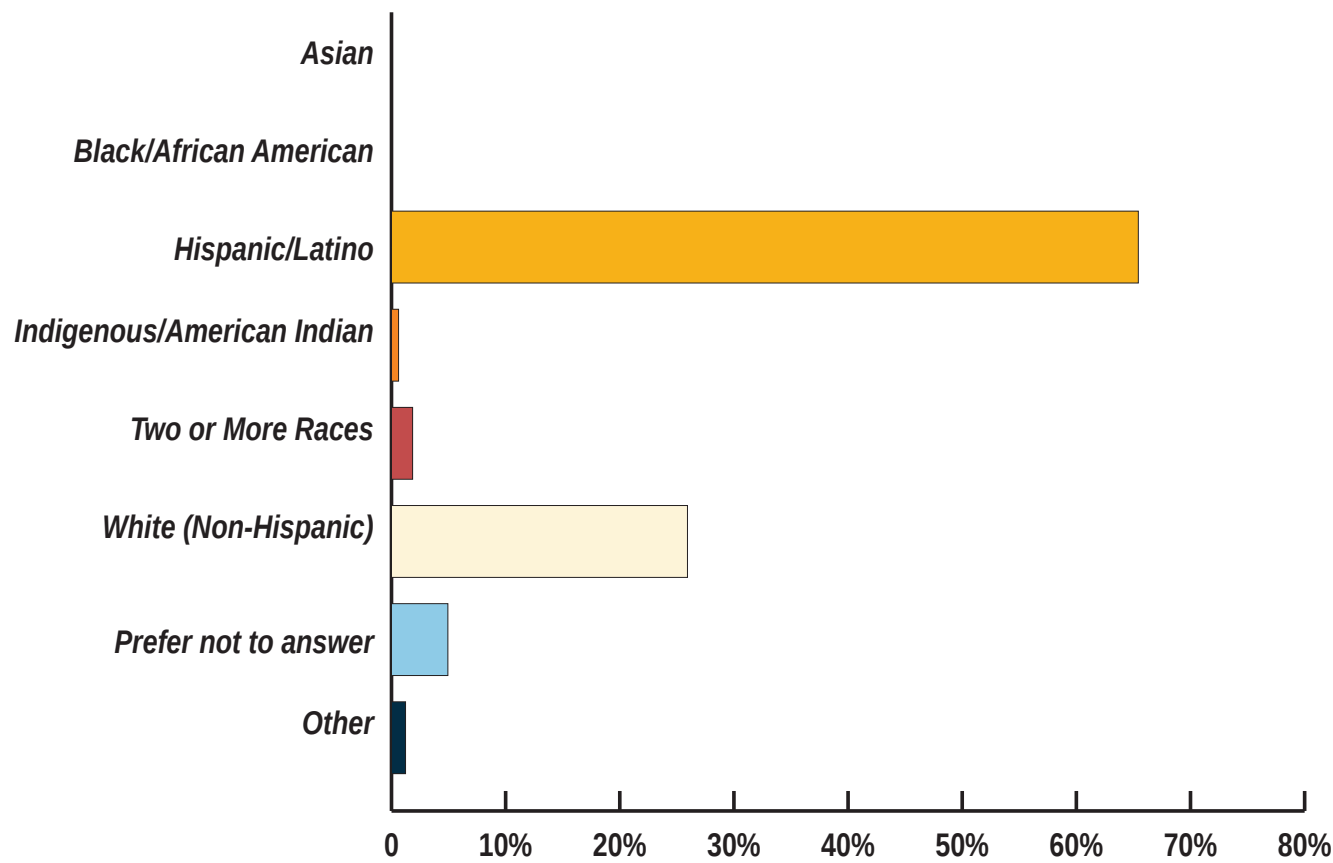
Most respondents report an annual household income between \$50,000 and \$99,900 (24.36%), which seems in line with Harlingen’s median household income of \$55,891, as reported on the American Community Survey (5-Years Estimates) 2019-2023. Survey results may skew towards higher incomes, with nearly half of respondents earning more than six figures. In comparison, less than 30% of total respondents report an annual household income under \$50,000.

Question 26. What is your age?



Most of the respondents who participated in the survey were middle-aged and older adults. Almost half of all respondents were 31 to 50 years old (49.08%), followed by those between 51 and 65 years old (29.45%). Participation was lowest among those under twenty (0.61%), while the same number of young adults between 21 and 30 years old and seniors over 65 responded to the survey (10.43%).

Question 27. What best describes your race/ethnicity?



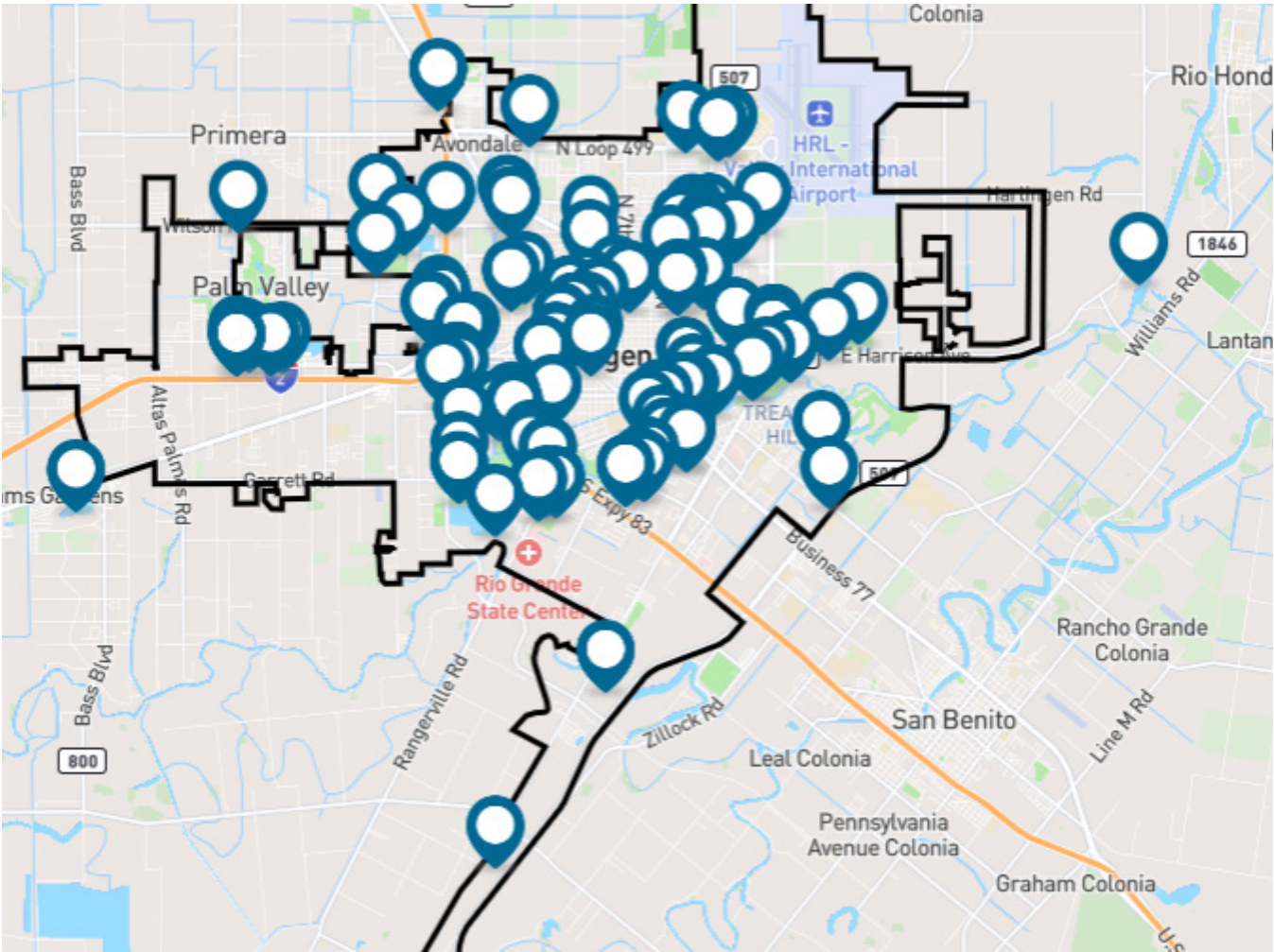
Most respondents identify as Hispanic or Latino (65.43%), followed by a quarter identifying as White only (25.93%). Nearly 5% of respondents refused to recognize their race, and none of the respondents described their race as Asian or Black/African American.

Online Pin Mapping Tool

The primary mechanism for greater virtual engagement for this plan was an online mapping activity where participants could leave georeferenced comments on a map of Harlingen. Website visitors could read and vote on others’ comments to express agreement or disagreement. This feature helped the project team identify the comments that were most relevant and helpful for developing recommendations. Key themes that emerged from the online map comments included:

- There is need for improved road maintenance, sidewalk construction and upgraded traffic management, including the incorporation of roundabouts and speed bumps.
- Improved safety through enhanced lighting in public parking lots and parks, along with increased enforcement patrols.
- There is a desire for improved community amenities such as updated playgrounds, the incorporation of greater greenery along significant corridors, shaded trails and an indoor amphitheater or recreational space.
- Addressing homelessness by creating supportive housing, relocating services and incorporating greater community resources to address the population.

The online mapping activity opened after the project launched in October 2024 and was available for continuous participation throughout most of the project process.

Public Engagement #1

On November 18, 2024 at 6pm at the Harlingen Community Center the planning team held its first community engagement event. The meeting was hosted by the City of Harlingen and facilitated by Freese & Nichols, the City's consultant. 55 participants signed in on the meeting sign in sheets. Advertisements were made via the City's communication channels, social media, and the project website. Advertisements and all meeting materials were made available in both English and Spanish. w

The purpose of this event was to educate the community on the upcoming process, how to get and stay involved and to gather initial feedback on their values, priorities and goals for the community, prior to the consultant team or City attempting to identify a set of goals and objectives. The evening began with a formal presentation by the consultant team, followed by an open house with interactive stations and one on one conversations with the participants. City staff were also in attendance and available to talk with residents.

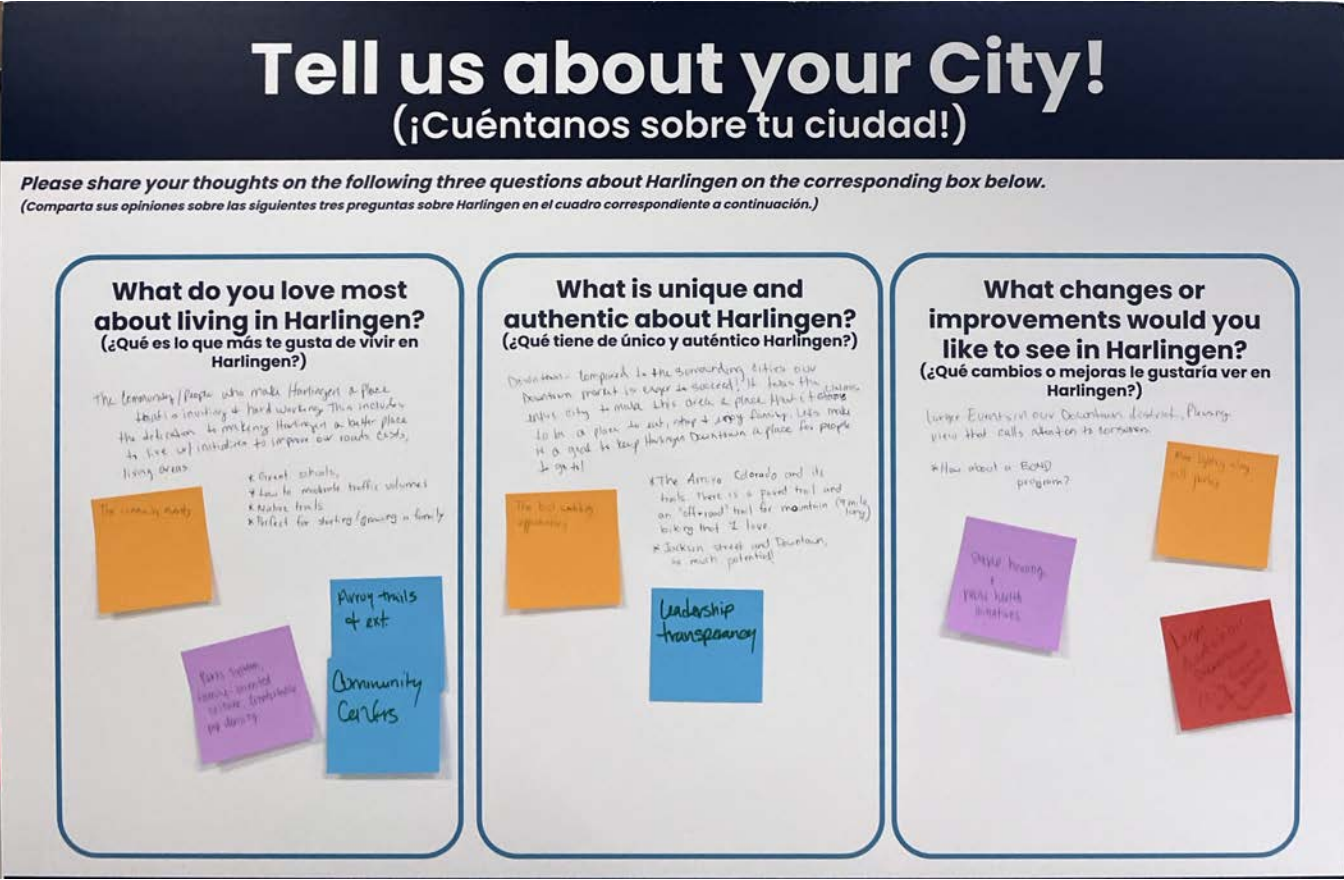

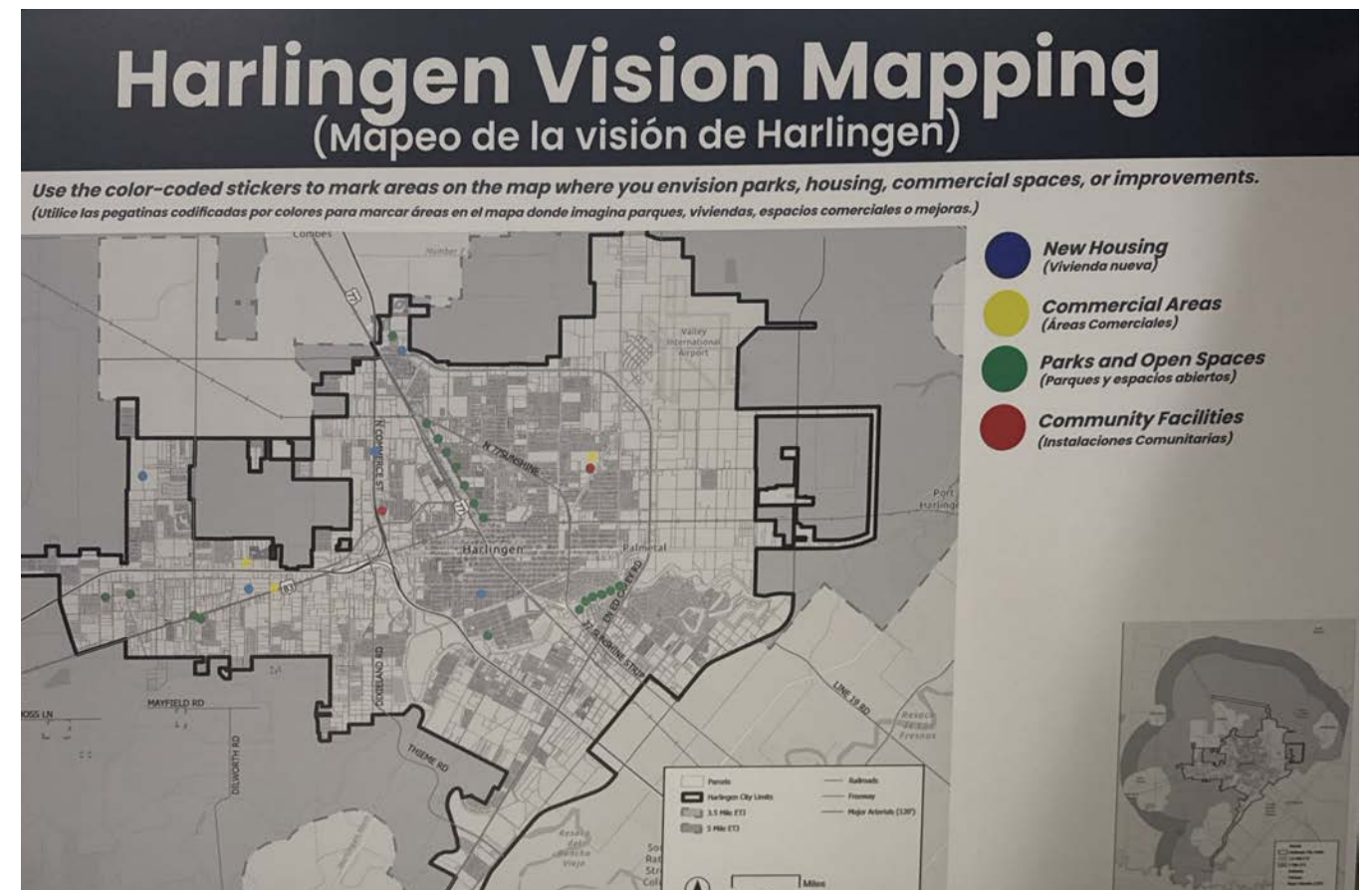

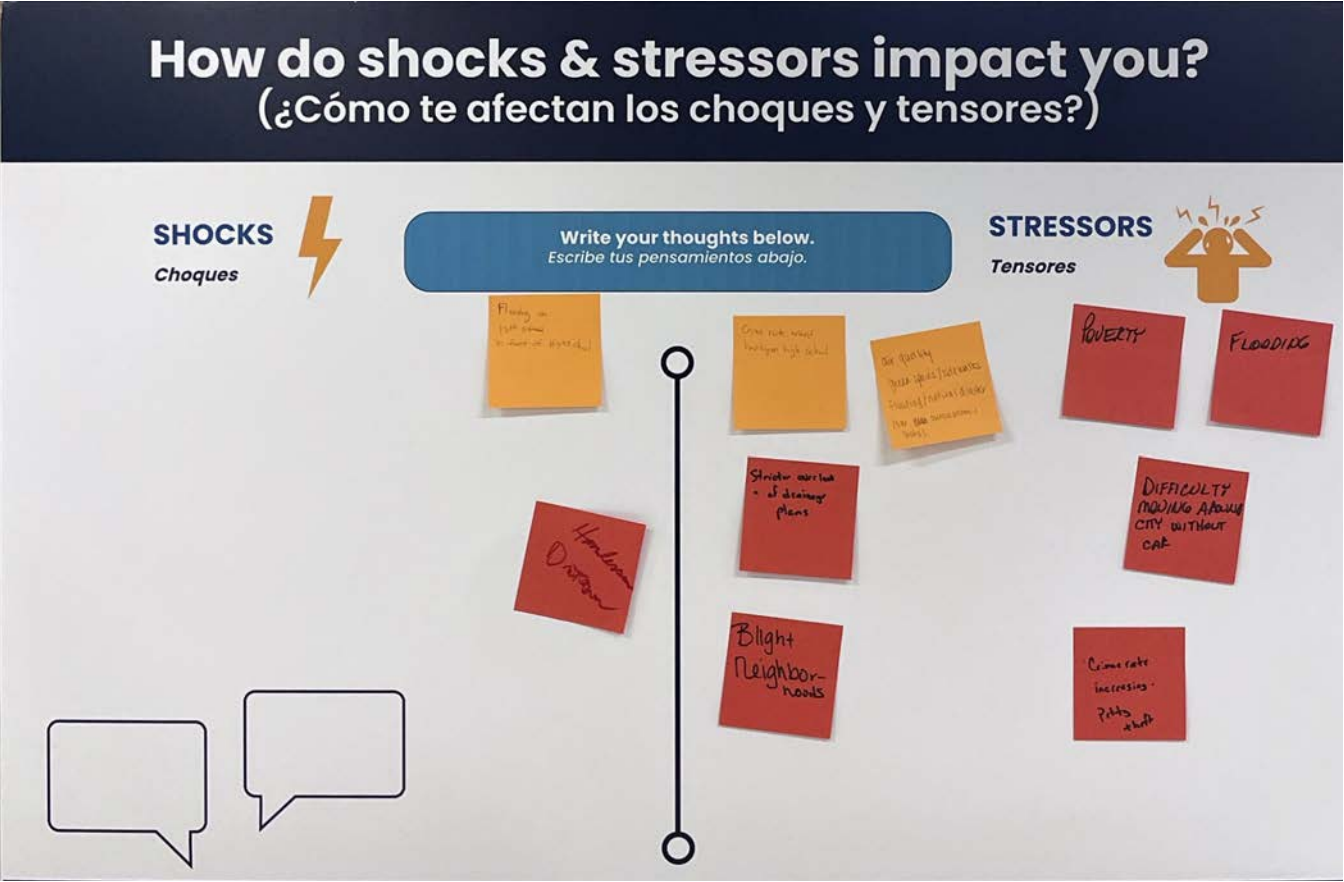

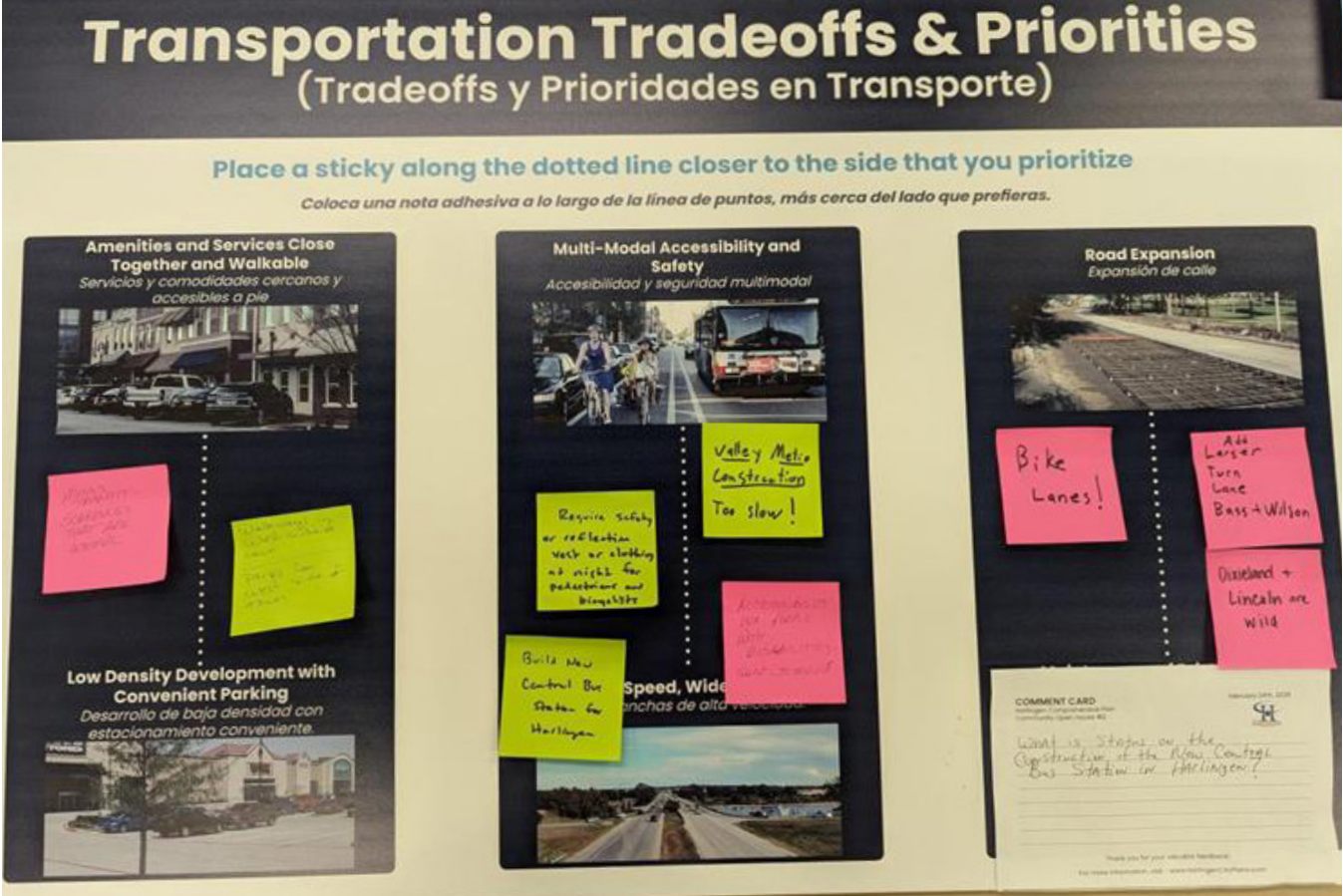

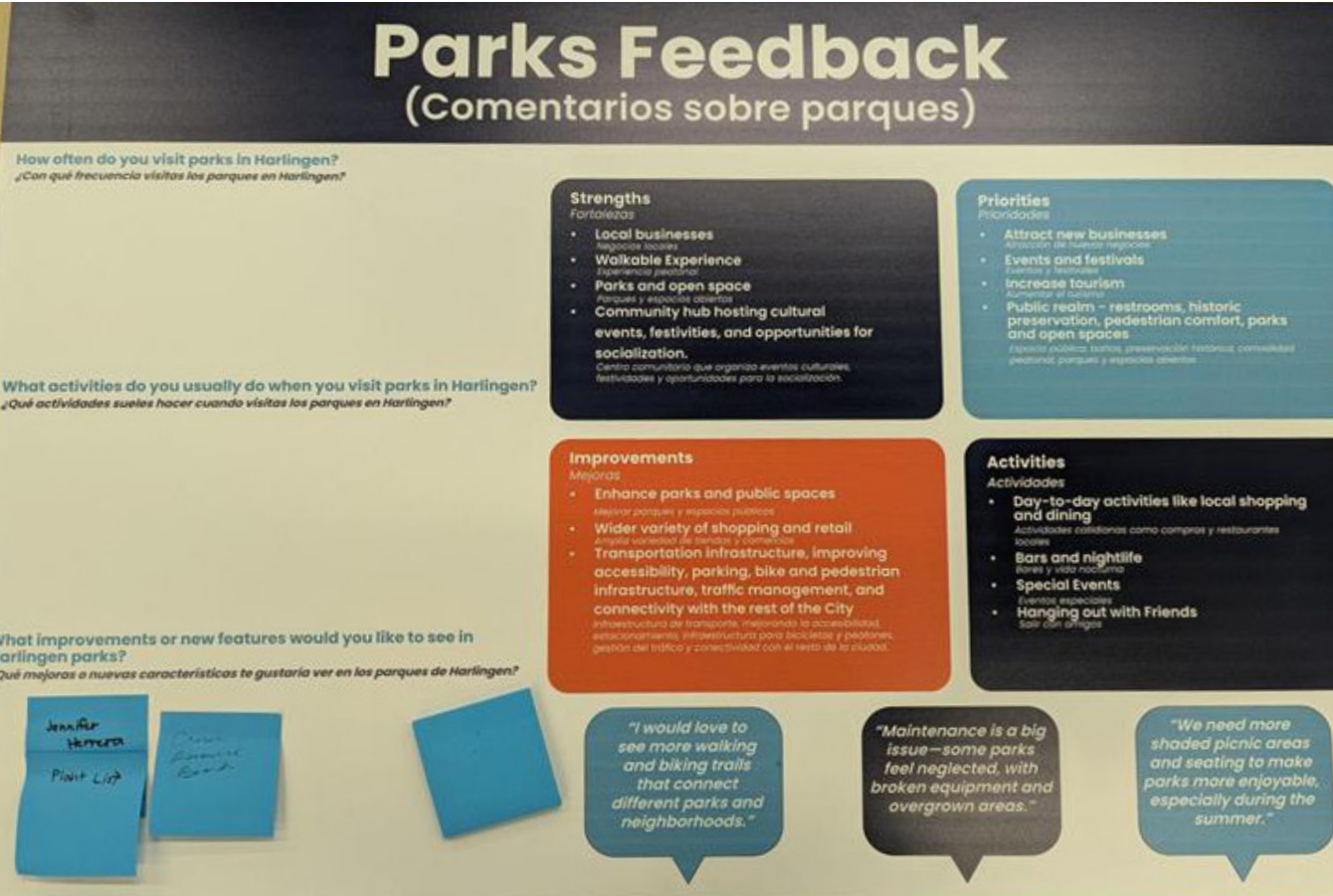

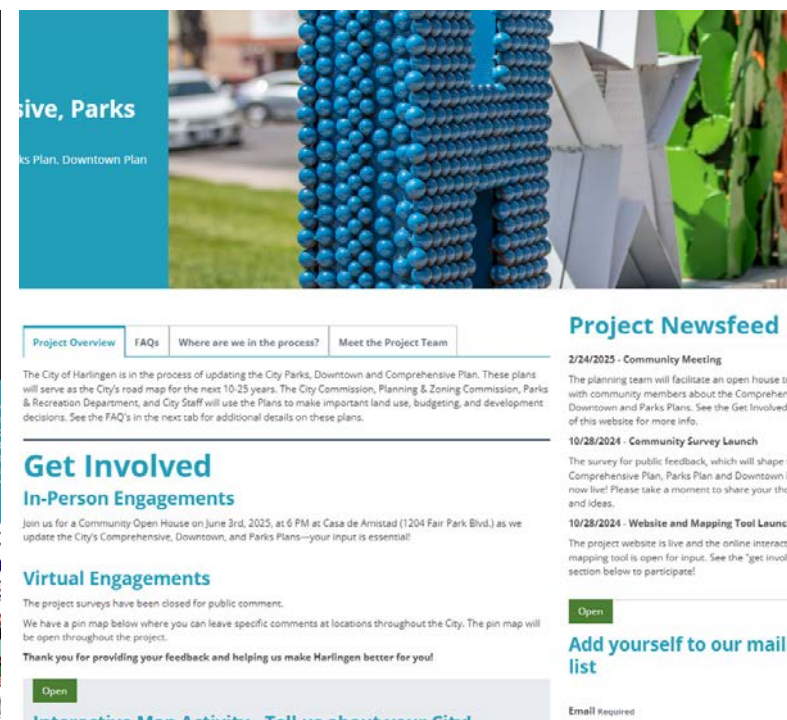

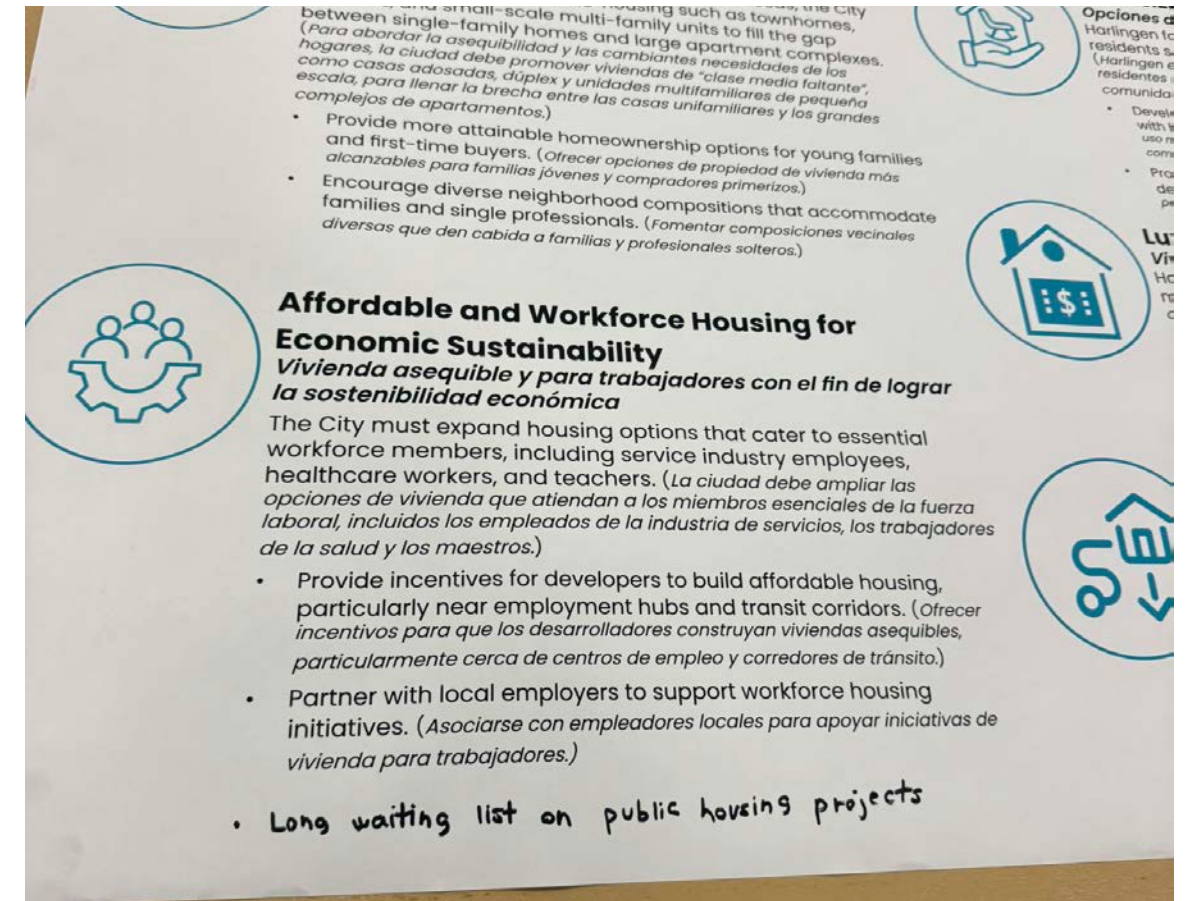

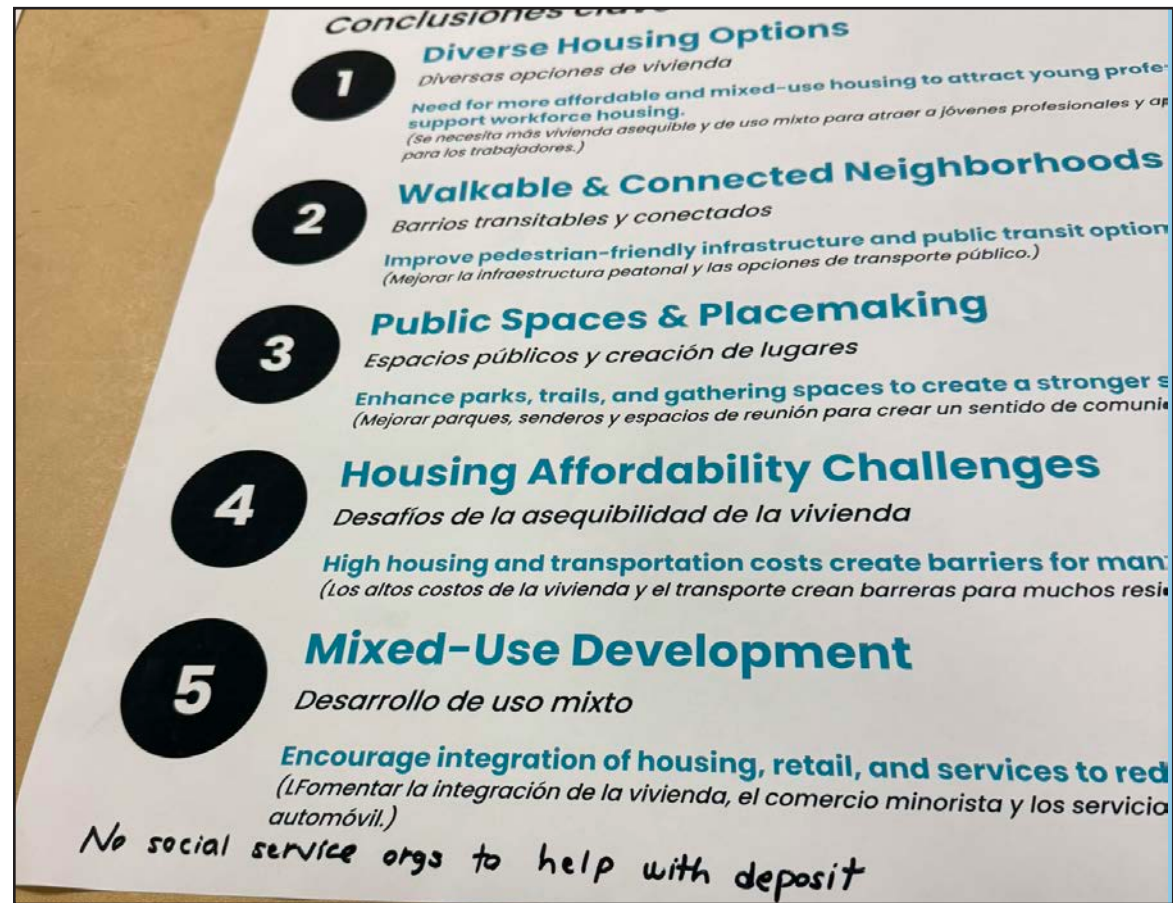

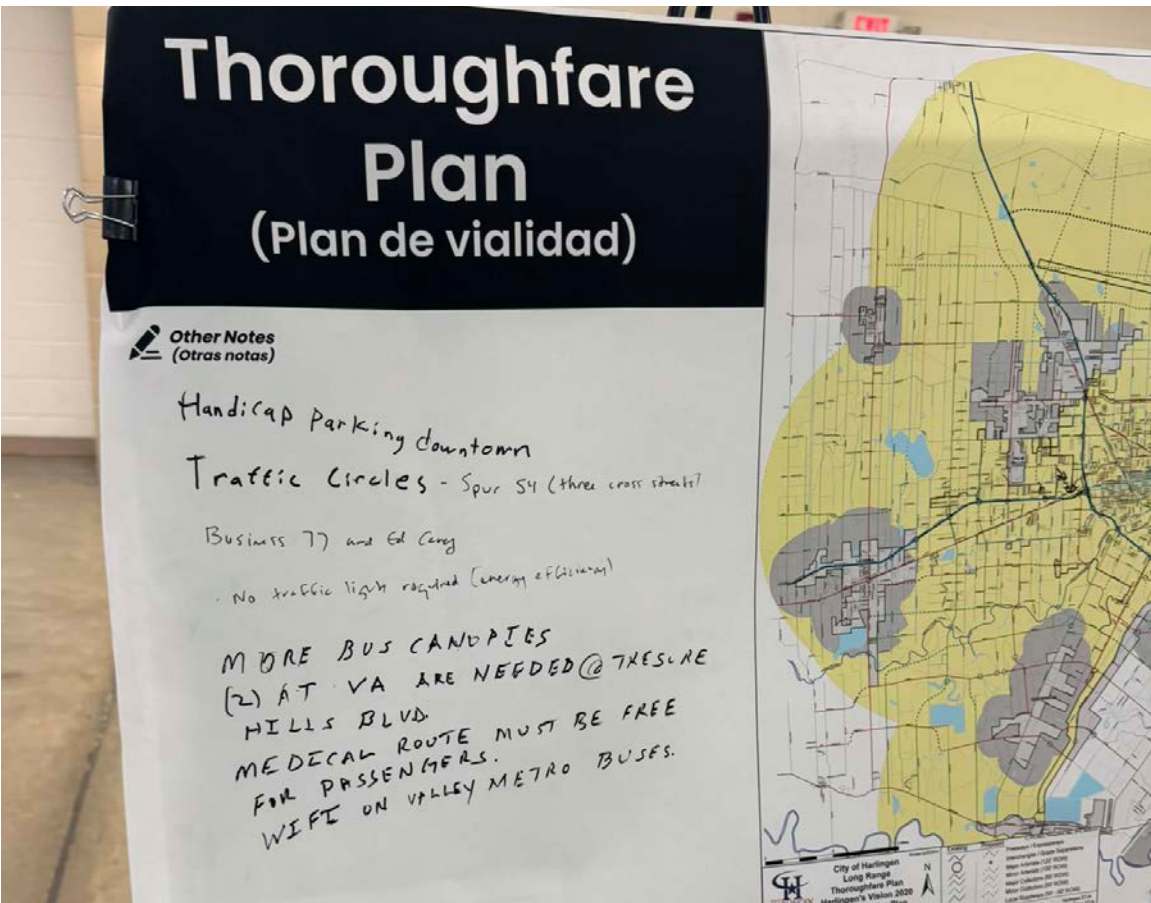

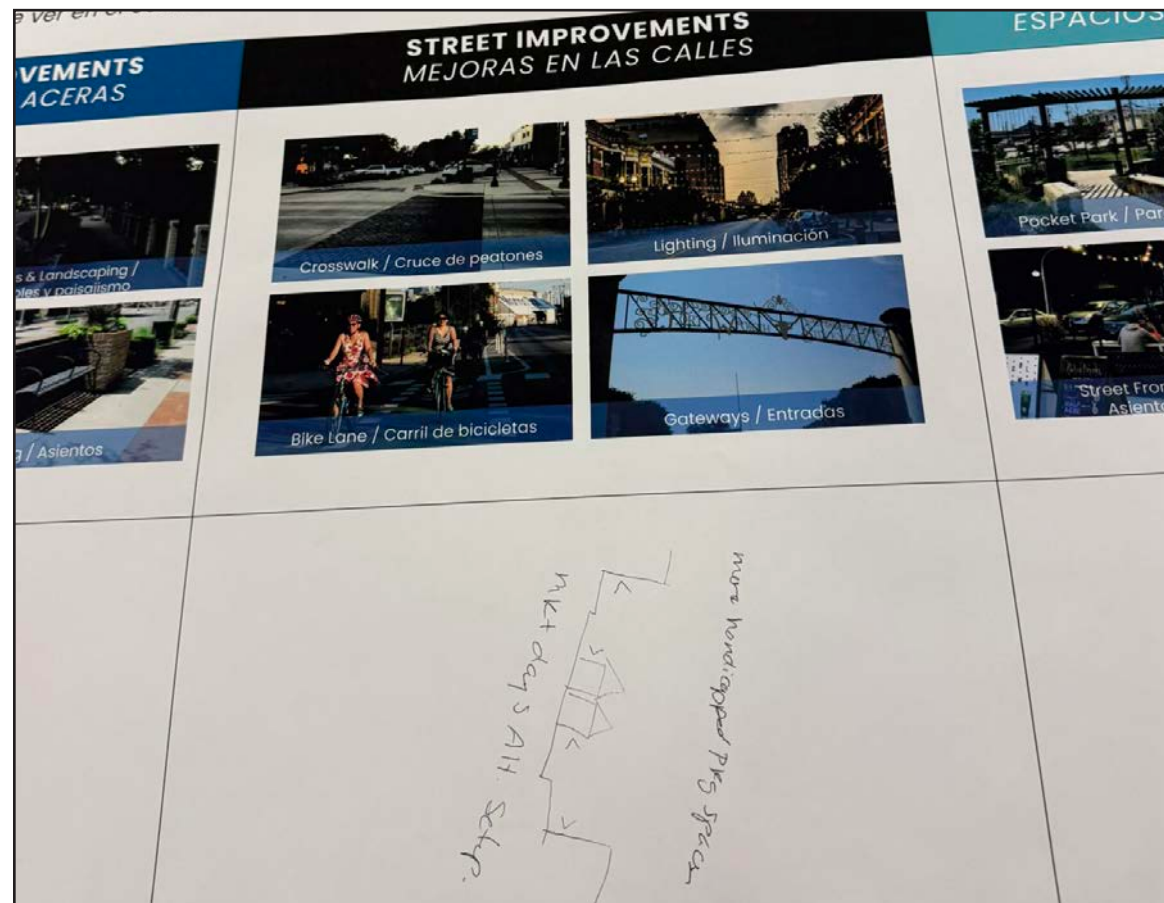

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, HARLINGEN, TEXAS, RELATING TO THE CREATION OF THE FOOD INSECURITY BOARD; CONTAINING FINDINGS AND OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE FOREGOING SUBJECT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

* * * * *

WHEREAS, food insecurity is a pressing, continuous, and growing problem in Harlingen; and

WHEREAS, over 73,000 Harlingenians have little to no access to healthy food, and approximately 16,000 children in Cameron County are experiencing food insecurity; and

WHEREAS, despite the tireless work of groups like the RGV Food Bank, many Harlingen residents continue to live without reliable, daily access to an adequate amount of affordable, nutritious food; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic, Winter Storm Uri, March 2025 Floodings, and other disasters have only exacerbated the problem of food insecurity; and

WHEREAS, development of a group to collaborate on ideas and solutions that address food insecurity problems and positively influence the policymaking and decision-making process for food, nutrition, and agriculture is imperative; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that the Food Insecurity Board is necessary and beneficial and is in the public interest to protect the health and welfare of the people of the City; **NOW, THEREFORE**,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HARLINGEN, TEXAS:

Section 1. That findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are determined to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as part of this Ordinance.

Section 2. That Article ___ of Chapter___ of the Code of Ordinances, Harlingen, Texas, is hereby amended by adding a new Division___ that reads as follows:

"DIVISION___. HARLINGEN FOOD INSECURITY BOARD

Sec. 2-346. Creation; purposes.

There is hereby created the Harlingen Food Insecurity Board ("board"). The board shall be responsible for advising and making recommendations to the mayor, city council, and department directors to address issues pertaining to food insecurity that exist in the City of Harlingen. Annually, the mayor shall assign to the board a topic of study and discussion on which the board shall report at least annually to the mayor and city council, and to council committees as requested. The subjects to be addressed by the board shall include, but not be limited to:

- (1) Reviewing and making recommendations regarding ways in which the resources and efforts currently devoted to address food insecurity can be best coordinated and implemented, and how those resources and efforts can be most effectively supplemented;
- (2) Identifying and developing policy suggestions, modeled after other municipalities, that have shown to decrease food insecurity;
- (3) Developing public and private partnerships to tackle aspects of food insecurity such as food deserts and food waste;
- (4) Identifying and developing policy suggestions to help tackle the social determinants of food insecurity, such as programs that help ensure affordable housing or transportation for people facing food insecurity;
- (5) Identifying federal, state, and local funding opportunities; and
- (6) Identifying areas in which gathering information through further study would decrease food insecurity in Harlingen.

Sec. 2-347. Appointment of members.

The board shall consist of representatives of the local non-profits and a faith group member, to be appointed by the non-profit, and reserve the right to appoint an alternate subject to confirmation by the city council, as specified in this section. These positions shall be numbered 1 through 12. The board members shall designate the board's chairperson from among the membership of the board.

Sec. 2-348. Composition of board; positions; terms of members.

- (a) Twelve of the regular members of the board shall be representative of non-profits, such as the United Way, Loafs & Fishes, Salvation Army, HCISD, TSTC, the two Rotary Clubs of Harlingen, Faith Groups, RGV Food Bank, Harlingen Neighborhood Food Pantry, American Red Cross, and UTRGV. The membership shall have an interest in issues affecting food insecurity and shall share a commitment to the goals of the board.
- (b) Members shall be broadly representative of the various sectors affected by, and/or working towards, a solution for food insecurity in Harlingen, such as the healthcare, agriculture, education, business, and nonprofit sectors.
- (c) Members shall serve a two-year term of office. The terms of members shall expire on December , 2027, and every two years thereafter.
- (d) Any member serving in a position for which the term has expired shall continue to serve until the member's successor in that position is appointed, confirmed, and qualified.

Sec. 2-349. Meetings.

Regular board meetings shall be held at least once a month. The board may establish for itself rules of order that are consistent with the City of Harlingen Code of Ordinances and are not in conflict with state law. Special meetings may be held in accordance with board rules. The board shall elect a vice-chair at the first board meeting and thereafter at the first meeting of each calendar year. A quorum of the members of the board shall consist of not less than a majority of the members. Neither the board nor any member shall have power to take action except by authority of majority vote.

Sec. 2-350. Assistance by certain city departments.

The office of the City Manager, Mayor, and Commission, and the Harlingen Health Department and their staff may provide requested assistance to the board.

Sec. 2-351. Compensation.

The members of the committee, in the performance of their duties as such, shall serve without compensation, provided that any member who is a city employee shall continue to receive regular compensation while serving on the committee."

Section 3. That the City Attorney is hereby authorized to direct the publisher of the Code of Ordinances, Harlingen, Texas, (the "Code") to make such non-substantive changes to the Code as are necessary to conform to the provisions adopted in this Ordinance, and also to make such changes to the provisions adopted in this Ordinance to conform them to the provisions and conventions of the published Code.

Section 4. That, if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this ordinance that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness or invalidity of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 5. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on such date and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A UNIFORM PROCEDURE FOR PLACING ITEMS ON THE AGENDA OF CITY BOARDS, COMMISSIONS, AND DEPARTMENTS; PROVIDING FOR EQUAL ACCESS BY BOARD MEMBERS; PROVIDING FOR CONFLICT RESOLUTION; PROVIDING FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE HARLINGEN CITY COMMISSION

WHEREAS, The City Commission of the City of Harlingen has determined that the orderly and efficient conduct of public business requires clear, uniform procedures for placing matters on the agenda of city boards, commissions, and departments; and

WHEREAS, The City of Harlingen is committed to ensuring equal opportunity for all appointed board and commission members to present items for discussion and possible action by their respective bodies; and

WHEREAS, The City Commission desires that each city board and department adopt a consistent agenda procedure reflecting the same principles applicable to the City Commission under the Texas Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551, Texas Government Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HARLINGEN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. PURPOSE.

This ordinance establishes a uniform policy and procedure for the inclusion of agenda items for all City of Harlingen boards, commissions, committees, and departments.

SECTION 2. AUTHORIZED PERSONS TO PLACE ITEMS ON THE AGENDA.

In any meeting of the Board governing any City Department whose meetings are subject to the Texas Open Meetings Act, the following persons may place an item on the agenda of their respective board, commission, or department:

1. The Board Chair
2. The Executive Officer or Director (as applicable);
3. The City Attorney or, if the Board is represented separately, the Board Attorney; or
4. Any two (2) members of the board or commission acting jointly.

SECTION 3. PROCEDURE.

A. Agenda items must be submitted in writing to the designated staff liaison or secretary by the published deadline before the meeting.

B. Each submission must include a concise description of the item, the proposed action (if any), and supporting materials necessary for inclusion in the posted packet.

C. The staff liaison shall ensure that properly submitted items are transmitted to the City

Secretary or posting authority for inclusion on the agenda in compliance with Section 551.041 of the Texas Government Code.

SECTION 4. EQUAL ACCESS AND NON-DISCRIMINATION.

- A. No board or commission member shall be denied the opportunity to request an agenda item provided he or she complies with the requirements of this ordinance.
- B. Agenda requests may not be refused or altered except for failure to meet statutory posting deadlines or for lack of sufficient specificity under the Texas Open Meetings Act.

SECTION 5. CONFLICT RESOLUTION.

Any dispute regarding inclusion or wording of an agenda item shall be referred to the City Attorney (Or Board Attorney if there is one) for review and written determination of compliance with law and consistency with this ordinance.

SECTION 6. IMPLEMENTATION.

All city boards, commissions, and departments shall amend their bylaws or procedural rules within sixty (60) days of the effective date of this ordinance to conform to this policy.

SECTION 7. SEVERABILITY.

If any provision of this ordinance is held invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.

SECTION 8. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage and adoption.
